CWA Decades Timeline Featured Image

1920's - Establishing CWA of WA The first West Australian regional branch of the Country Women's Association (CWA) of WA was set up in Nungarin, in July1924 and it is still operating today, followed by quickly followed by Metropolitan, Bolgart and Benjaberring.



1930's - Compassionate hearts during Great Depression

The Depression years had a disastrous impact on primary industries, creating poverty in rural regions. CWA of WA provided relief to struggling families through fundraising and in-kind donations.



1940's - The War Effort World War II demanded significant levels of fundraising and service by CWA of WA for servicemen on-thefront and families on the land. It also gave way to female representation on national committees

1950's - Population Growth in metropolitan and regional centres WA faced a decline of rural farming families, who moved to metropolitan and regional centres. This was partly caused by farming mechanisation and an increase of car ownership and sealed roads.

1960's - Vision of a Memorial for Pioneering Women of Western Australia

The Pioneer Women's Memorial at Kings Park opened in 1968, following six years of vision, planning and significant fundraising by the CWA of WA



1970's - Support for vulnerable citizens CWA of WA advocacy for the vulnerable continued, launching education programs for aboriginals, building residential units for older Australians and purchasing education vehicles for rural schools.

1980's - Awards, Recognition and Rural Advocacy As CWA celebrated entering Hall of Fame recognition for outstanding community service, members continued to lend-a-hand and advocate in support of the rural economic recession.



1990's - Encouraging education and professional skills in the regions CWA of WA launched Youth Leadership courses 1996, aimed to develop friends, confidence and skills of teamwork, over-coming challenges and leadership of like-minded youth.



2000's - Administration support for national aide continues

State and Federal Governments have repeatedly connected with CWA of WA for opinion, advice, administration skills and the gift of time, during times of emergency and distress.



2010's - Advocacy continues for the regions

CWA rallied on the steps of Parliament House, in possibly the most public display of historical support, to overturn Government decisions that were negatively impacting rural families.



ANZAC DAY

This years Anzac Day service was a beautiful Autumn morning allowing our community and visitors to commemorate Anzac Day.

Cr Jarron Noble was the MC for the service and began with his opening welcome.

"Today, along with Australians everywhere, we gather to remember those who have served to defend Australia. We do this because it is the anniversary of the day when Australian and New Zealand soldiers landed on the beach at Gallipoli in Türkiye on 25 April 1915. This was the first major military campaign for soldiers from Australia and New Zealand. Since then, 25 April has been known as Anzac Day.

At Gallipoli, Australians and New Zealanders served with soldiers from other nations, including England, France and India. The Australians at Gallipoli came from all sorts of backgrounds, but they shared the terrible experience of war. Ever since then, for more than a hundred years, the men and women in our navy, army and air force have honoured the memory of our original Anzacs.

Towards the end of the ceremony, the Last Post will be played. This historical music was played in army camps to announce the end of the day, a time when soldiers should be resting. The Last Post is played today for those who have made the ultimate sacrifice. It means that they have done their duty and are now at rest. After the Last Post, there will be one minute of silence. This is a time to think about those who have served in Australia's armed forces, those who continue to serve, and about those who have lost their lives."

Freeman Jim Sullivan gave the commemorative speech. Thank you for sharing your words with us.

"Let us never forget our Anzacs, who under shocking, circumstances, forged a bond of mateship, a proud respect for their fellow servicemen, a determination to do all for their country, Lest We Forget.

ANZAC, an acronym, meaning, Australian New Zealand Army Corp. Mateship, courage, respect, honour. Anzacs remembered, today respected. I wish to relate a story of one of these young men, a WW1 Infantry soldier. Christie Walter Alliston Jones

27th Infantry Battalion, enlisted 6th April 1916. Sailed from Adelaide to Southampton on the "Afric," arriving in Southampton on the 24th of July 1916, from there he proceeded to join his unit on the 11th August 1916. Reported missing presumed dead on the 17th of November 1916. The following letter was received from the Red Cross Society, following an inquiry by an elder sister.

The letter as follows-Dear Madam

Re 1656a PTE CW Jones 27th Battalion

Since making your inquiry, we note you have been notified, the above soldier was killed in action on the 5th of November. However, our commissioners have sent the following report, from a comrade, as follows.

PTE FR Sparrow1709, and we thought you would like to have the news.

"Jones belonged to, A Company. On the left of Flers, we made an attack and were pushed back, I saw him wounded and lying in NO Man's Land, having been hit by a bullet, he must have died shortly after. We regret we have not been able to obtain more particulars for you, might we offer you our sincere sympathy in your loss.

Lest we forget. Whilst we will never forget Christie's story, or the stories of other service men, we today must be aware of the silent Anzacs.

The silent Anzacs are with us today. The young Navy engineer, 3 young sons, joined up, full of energy, willing, able, educated, a career, his country, injured in a conflict, discharged, his life ahead. NO, his career gone, now three teenage sons, his life a mess, drinking every night, nightmares, rehab, cannot pursue his career, or talent, cannot deal with today.

The young pretty nurse, a qualified sister, tending the wounded from conflicts, captured, tortured, career over, motherhood not for her now.

The Army boy, dad of a bouncy four year old, off to East Timor, conflict,

what he experienced messed with his head, home discharged, career over, his beautiful son now 28, Dad a mess, no ability to live in today's society, no son, no marriage no control of his bodily functions.

Let us not forget these young men and women today serving. These young Anzacs in our modern day still serve our country, in the prime of their lives living in our streets, our towns, our cities, our country, their country, giving their youth to this country, so we can come together to pay our respect on the 25th April. They suffer silently, their ailments have many names, they do not seek. Sympathy, we do not know their stories, but we can thank them they need awareness, help and consideration. We thank the mothers, fathers and families sharing the load, do not let us forget the Silent Anzacs.

To all those who have served our nation, their sacrifice is why Australia has the freedom we all enjoy today, and why we have our sovereignty.

Kulin is to be congratulated on its initiative for allowing the Camp Hart Memorial and rest area facility to be constructed. A place where Anzacs can go for rest and fellowship in their times of need. Congratulations Kulin, thank you.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them.

Lest we forget"

Kulin Police remind everyone to ensure you drive safely and to the conditions as the winter months approach and to have good tyres fitted and efficient wiper blades on your vehicle and ensure all your lights are working correctly, on both, the vehicle being driven and any vehicle being towed.

General Information

The Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme commenced, 21 February 2024.

All Western Australian firearms licence holders are eligible to participate in the 2024 Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme and receive compensation for surrendered firearm(s).

In order to be eligible for a buyback scheme payment, Firearm Licence Holders must surrender the firearm(s) to a WA Police Station, during the period, **21 February 2024 to 31 August 2024**.

The Law and YOU:

Criminal Code, Part II Chapter IX (abridged)

70A. Trespass

trespass on a place, means —

- (a) to enter or be in the place without the consent or licence of the owner, occupier or person having control or management of the place;
- (b) to remain in the place after being requested by a person in authority to leave the place; or
- (c) to remain in a part of the place after being requested by a person in authority to leave that part of the place.
- (2) A person who, without lawful excuse, trespasses on a place is guilty of an offence and is liable to imprisonment for 12 months and a fine of \$12 000.
- (3) In a prosecution for an offence under subsection (2), the accused has the onus of proving that the accused had a lawful excuse.

. 70B. Trespassers may be asked for name and address

- (2) If the owner of any enclosed land finds a person on the land who has entered the land without the owner's consent, the owner may request the person to give the person's name and address to the owner.
- (3) A person who does not comply with such a request is guilty of an offence and is liable to a fine of \$500.
- (4) A person who in response to such a request gives a name or address that is false is guilty of an offence and is liable to a fine of \$500.

KULIN HARDWARE

Since the Battery Recycling Unit has been at the Kulin Hardware, we, as a town have recycled 125kg of battery waste and avoided landfill. Only 10 per cent of lithium-ion batteries in Australia were recycled in 2021, likely due to low collection rates. As there is currently no national recycling scheme, the batteries are stored and forgotten or discarded. A 2018 report by CSIRO estimated that most lithium-ion batteries end up in landfill.

We have been following our ocean theme the past 2 weeks which has brought much colour into our day, especially our craft activities. Our after-school children are pictured here using water colour and pipettes to paint



sea animals. It's great for younger children to watch older children create art with finer motor skills as it inspires them. Playdough has been out again as we love how it supports children to learn so many new skills, creating, fine motor, scissors. The themed playdough mats supported the children's creativity when making their sea creatures on this day.





Our Educators are always on the lookout for self-directed play or themes of interest which they can scaffold the children's learning from. Construction with Lego blocks is great for supporting problem solving skills, it also gives children the ability to use their imagination skills to

create houses, enclosures, or towers practising spatial awareness.

Pictured above is an example of our Educators supporting children directed paly by creating a track for them to move the trucks along. This allows them to re-imagine their game and learn new skills. In this setting the schema of trajectory is at play, this allows the children to explore different outcomes of the truck balance, steering, veering, fast, slow etc.

The children have loved our freshly painted storage shed and having the ability to paint a vast space with no limits. During this



play they are practising



crossing the midline and strengthening their hand and arm muscles. The shed is always hosed fresh for another day.

Foam blocks provide children with the opportunity to lift and move larger improving their muscle strength and gross motor. When children play using these blocks they often work as a team achieve an outcome (tower). This provides a great opportunity for them to practise their communication and

teamwork as they achieve a goal. They also provide children with the ability to build a chair and take a minute to relax or practise big body movement rolling and jumping. Thank you from KCCC team for the second donation of seedlings to our centre and our recycled materials received this past fortnight. We wish Shelbi all the best for her and Zach's next adventure north and beyond it has been an amazing time having you at our centre, we feel so lucky!



Lemon Blueberry Puff Pastry Tart

Ingredients

CREAM CHEESE LAYER

4 oz. cream cheese, softened 1/4 c. confectioners' sugar Juice and zest of 1/2 lemon

BLUEBERRY LAYER

2 c. fresh blueberries 2 tbsp. granulated sugar Juice of 1/2 lemon

CRUMBLE & ASSEMBLY

2 tbsp. granulated sugar Zest of 1/2 lemon 1/2 c. all-purpose flour 4 tbsp. (1/2 stick) unsalted butter, melted 1 sheet frozen puff pastry, thawed

Directions Step 1 Preheat oven to 400°. Place a baking sheet in oven to preheat.

Step 2 In a medium bowl, using a rubber spatula, mix cream cheese, confectioners' sugar, lemon zest, and lemon juice until combined.

BLUEBERRY LAYER

In another medium bowl, combine blueberries, granulated sugar, and lemon juice.

CRUMBLE & ASSEMBLY

Step 1 In another medium bowl, rub granulated sugar and lemon zest with your fingers until fragrant; mix in flour. Add butter and stir until combined.

Step 2 On a piece of parchment, roll pastry to a 12"-x-9" rectangle. Fold in sides about 1/4" all the way around to create a border.


Step 3

Spread cream cheese layer in center of pastry up to border. Spoon blueberry layer over cream cheese. Sprinkle crumble over. Very carefully slide parchment onto preheated sheet.

Step 4

Bake tart until pastry is golden brown and puffed and blueberries are bursting, 20 to 25 minutes. Let cool 10 minutes before slicing.

Which Day is International Mother's Day?

Australia is one of the countries that celebrates Mother's Day on International Mother's Day (aka the second Sunday of May). International Mother's Day isn't really international because many countries choose to celebrate Mother's Day (or an equivalent holiday) on other days of the year that hold more religious or cultural significance to them.

International Mother's Day is different from International Women's Day which is held annually on March 8th.

Why do Mother's Day dates differ between Australia and other countries?

Mother's Day originally started in the U.S. in the early 1900s - though there have been celebrations for mothers for thousands of years now. Mother's Day is always held on the same date in many countries, including Australia.

Some countries celebrate Mother's Day on Mothering Sunday (the Fourth Sunday, exactly three weeks prior to Easter Sunday). This year, Mothering Sunday will fall on Sunday, the 19th of March.

How do Australians celebrate Mother's Dav?

As a child, you probably started Mother's Day by making Mum some slightly charred pancakes and delivering them to her with a goofy smile and a lukewarm coffee. Adult Mother's Day traditions generally include better food. BBQs, brunch at a swanky cafe, gourmet picnics in the park, or a Mother's Day hamper are all common ways to celebrate your beloved mother.

Gift-giving is also an incredibly important part of the Mother's Day holiday. Traditional Mother's Day gifts include chocolates, candles, pamper hampers, pyjamas, and flowers. The traditional Mother's Day flower is Red Carnations. However, because Australia's Mother's Day date is in Autumn and Red Carnations are a spring flower, most people give White Chrysanthemums instead.

Giving gifts on Mother's Day gained

popularity after 1924. That year, Sydney woman Janet Heyden took it upon herself to collect charitable gifts for lonely mothers in Newington Hospital who lost husbands and/or sons during World War 1.

Is Mother's Day a public holiday in Australia?

Unfortunately, Mother's Day isn't an official public holiday in Australia. It's very widely celebrated and a national holiday, however, and most Australians observe the holiday in some way.

Do the shops open on Mother's Day? Yes, most Australian businesses are open on Mother's Day – though some small businesses do restrict their opening hours or close entirely.

When was Mother's Day introduced in Australia?

The first Mother's Day in Australia was held in 1910. This initial celebration was mostly limited to special church services. However, by the 1920s, many Australians had started celebrating mothers on Mother's Day.

Where does Mother's Day come from? (the history of Mother's Day) Mother's Day as we know it today all started with an initiative from Anna Jarvis in the early 20th Century. Jarvis started her Mother's Day campaign in 1905 in the U.S. - the same year her own mother, Ann, died.

Ann Jarvis was a peace activist who looked after wounded soldiers in the American Civil War. Ann also started a work club she named the "Mother's Day Work Clubs" to speak out against public health issues. Anna Jarvis wanted to honour her Mother and continue the work she had spent her lifetime undertaking. She decided that it was only fair to set aside a day for celebrating mothers because she believed a mother is "the person who has done more for you than anyone in the world." Originally, she called Mother's Day "Mothers Friendship Day".

The first modern Mother's Day was celebrated in 1908 when Jarvis held a remembrance day for her own mother

at St Andrew's Methodist Church (in Grafton, West Virginia). This church now holds the International Mother's Day Shrine.

Anna Jarvis also founded the Mother's Day International Association. All along, her intention with Mother's Day was to get people to celebrate the mother figure in their life (rather than celebrating motherhood as a whole).

In 1914, U.S. President Woodrow Wilson was the person who made the Mother's Day holiday official (this year also marked the U.S.'s first official Mother's Day). The rest is history.

Celebrating Mother's Day is a fairly new pastime, but celebrations honouring mothers have been held for thousands of years. Some notable examples include:

Christian Mothering Sunday (originally a commemoration of the Mother Church, not motherhood directly)

The festivals held in ancient Greece to honour mother goddesses Cybele and Rhea

The Roman Festival of Hilaria
