Plenty of things on the go at the Shire of Kulin as we have the final push to finish our 2024-25 projects and plan our 2025-26 projects. Thank you to everyone who contributed their ideas and projects for next years budget. These have been captured and will form part of our budget deliberations.

Over the past few months we have been developing the Shire of Kulin Strategic Integrated Plan. This incorporates the Strategic Community Plan and Corporate Business Plan. The plan is based on a shared vision between the Shire's communities (Kulin, Dudinin, Holt Rock and Pingaring) and Council. It has been really pleasing that 162 people participated in the online surveys and community workshops. Thank you to everyone for getting involved and having a say. The Draft Strategic Integrated Plan is now available for public comment. Please take the time to look over the plan and provide your feedback for consideration. The detailed actions are on pages 9-13.

The Ordinary Meeting of Council was held Wednesday 21st May and the key points from that meeting were:

- Adoption of the 2025-26 Fees and Charges
- Renewable Energy Fact Sheet endorsed to provide information to landholders when negotiating renewable energy developments (Wind, solar, battery storage)
- Approval of the concept plan for the RV Visitor Enhancement Project (old



skate park). We will be creating an area that will enhance the amenity for community members to utilise while also being a welcoming spot for visitors to improve their experience. Key components of the project are the installation of a Shade Structure, 2 bench seats under the shade structure, 2 round tables to replace the existing wooden tables under the trees, one smart solar bench, double gas barbeque, and water fountain. The project will create a welcoming space that integrates with the natural surroundings, preserving and incorporating the existing trees and being enhanced by plantings.

- Two (2) fans are to be installed at the Freebairn Recreation Centre. The project will benefit our community and sporting clubs by improving the air circulation in the court area which will make the area more comfortable for players and spectators.
- Aquatic Centre slide pool – the slide has been removed and the new pool cement has been installed. This project also includes improvements to the area which will be worked on with completion by June 30.
- Macrocarpa Trail – crossover areas at the Corrigin-Kulin

Road have been completed with the installation of bollards. If you haven't had time to enjoy the new trail grab your joggers or your bike and enjoy the new trail.

From the CRC we have some events coming up for the community. Australia's Biggest Morning Tea, which will raise funds for cancer research, has been changed from Wednesday 28th May (next week) to 10th June. We have also rescheduled our seniors movie for June to Thursday 12th June.

Regional Tech Hub will be in Kulin on Tuesday 3rd June 2025 at the CRC to present Connectivity Without Confusion. The session will help you to understand your internet and phone connection options and is a great local event. Bring along your devices and your questions and get assistance.

Upcoming events at the Freebairn Recreation Centre is joint winter sport this weekend and the Colts Carnival on the weekend of 13-15 June.

I hope everyone enjoys this edition of The Kulin Update and as always, get in touch if you have any ideas to share. We love to hear from our community.

Additionally, the association is seeking interest from local business owners who would like to become associate members. Membership includes:

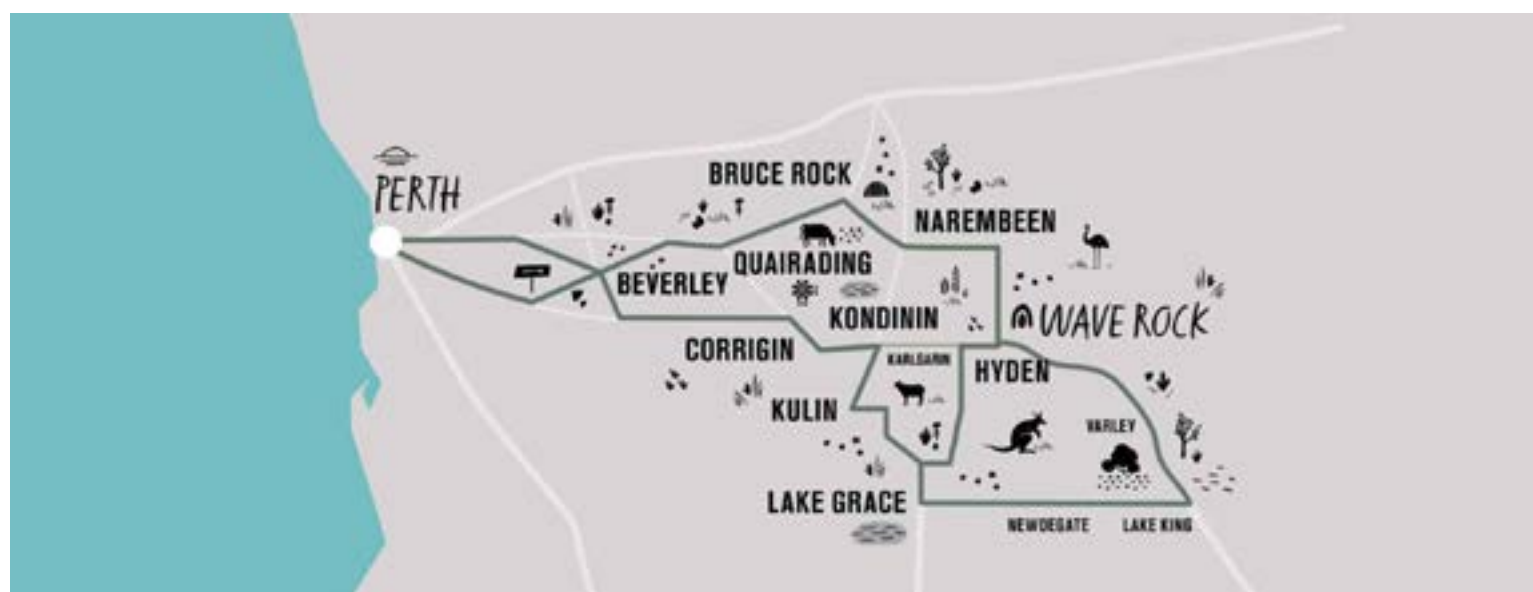
- Access to meeting agendas and minutes, keeping members informed about regional developments.

Negotiating with Renewable Energy Developers Fact Sheet for Landholders



The Shire of Kulin and its neighbours are the site of potential renewable energy developments (Wind, Solar, and Battery Storage) because of the proximity to power infrastructure and distribution networks in Collie as the State seeks to meet its renewable energy targets with cessation of coal by 2030. Several wind farm projects have been announced in the Shire, with dedicated or additional solar, and Battery Storage (BESS) components, with more potentially into the future.

However, signing an agreement with a renewable energy company is a significant decision that requires careful consideration. This fact sheet provides an overview of key topics and considerations for landholders, for comprehensive guidance. The Shire recommends reviewing resources from the Queensland Farmers Federation and the Australian Energy Infrastructure Commissioner.

Legal and Financial Advice



- **Professional Guidance:** Consult with legal and financial experts to protect your interests. Experts can assist with contract navigation, tax implications and securing favourable terms.
- **Insurance Considerations:** Ensure adequate insurance coverage for potential risks associated with turbines on your land.

Negotiation Power



- **Payment Terms:** Negotiate favourable payment structures including options for upfront payments and annual leases.
- **Access Rights & Obligations:** Secure terms for property access, operational conduct, and decommissioning responsibilities.

Potential Impacts



- **Land Use & Property Values:** Understand how turbines may impact farming practices, impact on rates, property access, and future development potential.
- **Community Relations:** Consider possible effects on relationships with neighbours and the broader community due to visual and noise impacts.

Project Development Process



- **Stages of Development:** From site assessment to construction and operation, each phase brings potential changes and delays.
- **Timeline Adjustments:** Be aware that timelines may shift, impacting the expected project completion and lease terms.

Community Engagement



- **Transparent Communication:** Engaging with neighbours can help foster a supportive community environment for the project.
- **Stakeholder Relations:** Open dialogue with stakeholders is essential for addressing community concerns and building trust.

Long-Term Commitment



- **Lease Duration:** Agreements may last for decades, impacting future land use and generational planning.
- **Income Potential:** Consider the project's long-term financial benefits alongside its land use implications.

Environmental Impact



- **Impact Assessment:** Assess the potential effects on wildlife and habitats.
- **Mitigation Measures:** Work with developers on strategies to minimise environmental disruption.



NEGOTIATION TIPS

- **Payment Structures:** Seek fair compensation with clear terms, including annual fees, payment of any additional rates attributed to the project, and possible performance bonuses.
- **Project Timeline:** Define phases clearly, from construction through to operation and eventual decommissioning.
- **Neighbour Payments:** If applicable, consider compensation terms for any impact on neighbouring properties.
- **Group Negotiations:** Collaborate with nearby landholders to strengthen bargaining power.
- **Expert Advice:** Enlist legal, financial, and insurance experts to safeguard your interests.

ADDITIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

- **Technology Changes:** Advancements in technology may affect project design and income potential. Stay informed on new developments.
- **Project Scope Changes:** Understand that the scope might shift during the planning stage, affecting your agreed terms.
- **Easement Acquisition:** Negotiate fair compensation for any easements on your land for transmission lines or other infrastructure.
- **Land Access:** Establish clear guidelines for survey, construction, and maintenance access.
- **Communication:** Maintain open lines of communication with developers through the project lifecycle.
- **Community Engagement:** Actively participate in community forums to address concerns and foster positive engagement.
- **Post-Construction Obligations:** Ensure developers adhere to decommissioning commitments and restore the land to its original condition.
- **Rates:** The Shire may well impose additional rates on land the subject of renewable energy projects. Ensure that your agreement income reflects who pays this or allows for it.



FOR MORE INFORMATION

The Shire encourages landholders to carefully review available resources and guides, and to engage with professionals before entering into agreements. The steps outlined in this fact sheet aim to empower landholders with knowledge and practical advice as they consider renewable energy opportunities on their land.

Over the past couple of years, KBR and Blaze have been working closely on infrastructure upgrades at the racetrack – to safeguard the future of both our events. The Blazing Swan Department of Public Works volunteers deconstructed the KBR marquee frame during our event pack down – and wasn't that a sight to see. After 30 years on the site, and 11 years sheltering Blazing Swan volunteers – it felt like a fond good-bye to pull the old girl down and get her ready for her new home. Blazing Swan as an event wouldn't be what it is today, had it not been for your kindness and willingness to take a chance.

It would be amiss of us not to acknowledge the road incidents this year. We would like to extend an enormous amount of gratitude to those emergency services, community members, and passersby, who offered assistance and comfort. At Blazing Swan, we have a number of safeguards – aimed at ensuring our participants get to, and home, from the event safely. These include our Survival Guide book, our Leavers Crew at the exit gate, the shutdown of music and activity from 11.59PM on Monday (ahead of Tuesday closure), and email communications via our ticketing platform. Despite our best efforts, there was an increase in road accidents this year.

These accidents would be concerning to any community, and we have not taken this figure lightly. Our community rallied behind these individuals, and we are glad to know that nobody was catastrophically injured. We will be working very closely with local stakeholders and our community, to debrief, make changes if required, and continue our education about driving in the regions and getting home safe.

KULIN LIONS CLUB

The first day I came to Kulin to look at our house, I wandered outside IGA with my family. We were a little early to check out the property, so we thought we'd make use of our time seeing what was happening in town and who was about. We were swiftly instructed—by more than one person—to wander down Day Street.

“Just head round the corner and along the street, and you'll find Haydn sitting out the front of his shed. He can tell you all about Kulin.”

And truth it was.

Now that we are settled here, I took the time to visit Haydn in his shed of wonders and have a chat about something really important to him—the Kulin chapter of the Lions Club.

For those who aren't familiar, the Lions Club is an international community-based service organisation that focuses on improving the lives of others, both within local communities and in the wider world.

The Kulin Lions Club has been running for 53 years, originally chartered on 5 December 1972. Remarkably, two of the founding members—Haydn McInnes and Harold Proud—are still active and continue working to make positive improvements in our community.

At its core, the Lions Club values helping others who need a hand. They've stepped in during tough times, like when freak winds blew down a local's house, ensuring a new one was built as quickly as possible. Every year, they make sure every child at Kulin District High School—from Kindy through to Year



Two—receives an Easter egg. And at their last meeting, they donated over \$4,500—an incredible contribution shared among Kulin District High School, Royal Flying Doctors Service, Breast Cancer Foundation, Kids for Cancer, and Hearing Dogs.

The Kulin Lions Club is open to both men and women and currently has 12 active members. Anyone over 18 can join, but the average age of members is 79—with the youngest member a lively 54, and the oldest, Mr Harold Proud, still energetic at 104! This community-minded group of mates is looking for new members to carry the legacy forward.

Haydn told me he helped start the Kulin chapter of the Lions Club because of a lesson from his uncle, Richard (Dick) McInnes, who was a founder of the Road Board in Kulin back in the town's early days.

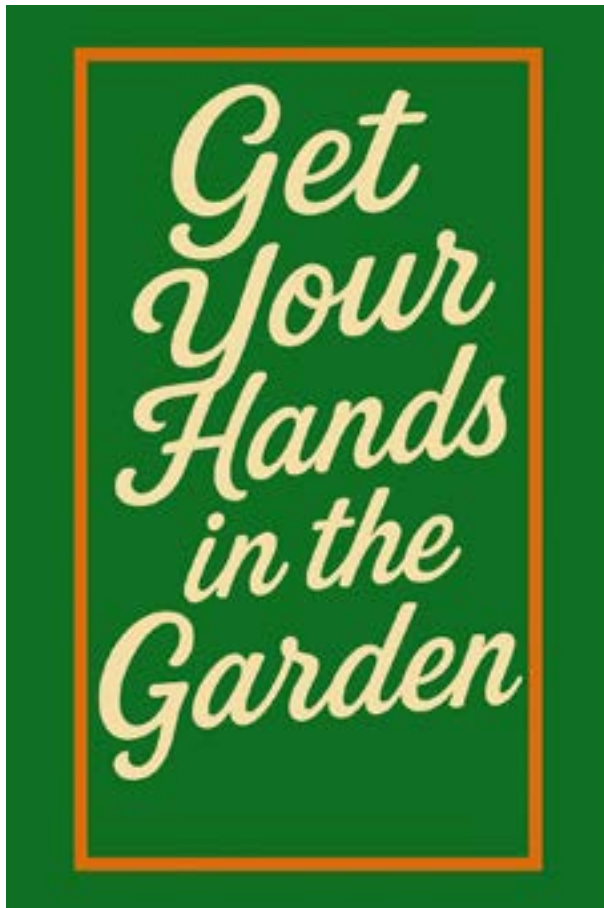
That's when this little library becomes a lifeline.

COOKING CORNER

After reading about some of the festivals happening in South America and lighting the fire for the first time this week, I was thinking about some of my family's favourite dinners to get cosy. Which lead me straight to Chilli Con Carne and Cornbread. My goodness this is delicious, the kind of dinner where I end up with the urge to find some elastic waisted pants because it's too tasty not to go for a second bowl. But! If you can resist the urge, Golden Syrup Dumplings are a sure fire winner for a sweet treat at the end of the meal. I'm a dollop of double cream girl with my dumplings but the kids go straight for the icecream. Really though its that soft doughy goodness smothered in sweet golden sauce and now I'm starving again...

CHILLI CON CARNE with CORNBREAD TOPPING

Serves 6 -8

CHILLI CON CARNE

2 Onions
2 x 400g cans of Chopped Tomatoes
4 tbsps Tomato Sauce
4 tbsps Tomato Paste
2 tablespoons Cocoa Powder
1 x 400g can of Kidney Beans (drained)
2 cloves garlic minced
2 tbsps Olive Oil
2 tsp Chilli Flakes (or to taste)
1 tsp Ground Coriander
1 tsp Ground Cumin
3 Cardamom Pods (bruised)
1 Red Capsicum
750g Minced Beef / Diced Steak

CORNBREAD

1 1/2 tsp Salt
650g Cornmeal/Fine Polenta
4 tbsps Plain Flour
6 tps Baking Powder
2 tps Ground Cinnamon
750ml Buttermilk
4 lge Eggs
2 tps Honey
4 tbsps Vegetable Oil
150g grated Cheddar Cheese

TO SERVE

Guacamole
Sour Cream
Grated Cheese
Jalapenos

1. Peel and finely chop the onions; Heat the oil in a very large pan — it has to take everything later — and fry the onion and garlic until they begin to soften. Add the chilli, coriander, cumin and crushed cardamom pods and stir well.

2. Deseed and finely dice the capsicum, and add to the pan. Break up the minced beef/diced steak into the pan and brown off.

3. Add the chopped tomatoes, kidney beans, tomato sauce, tomato paste and a cup of water, stirring to make a rich red sauce. When the chilli starts

to boil, sprinkle over the cocoa and stir it in. Simmer partially covered for 1½ hours. *At this point you can cool and freeze the chilli, or just keep it in the fridge — or a cool place — overnight.*

4. Preheat the oven to 200°C Fan Forced. Tip the chilli into a large, wide dish or keep it in the pan if its ovenproof.

5. Combine the salt, cornmeal, flour, baking powder and cinnamon in a bowl.

6. Whisk together the buttermilk, eggs, honey and oil in a jug, and then stir into the dry ingredients, mixing to make a vivid yellow batter.

7. Pour the cornmeal topping over the chilli con carne, or blob it over to cover the top as evenly as possible. Don't worry if some of the chilli seeps through as this won't matter one tiny bit.

8. Sprinkle the cheese over the top of the cornbread and then bake in the oven for 30 minutes or until the cornbread topping is risen and golden and the chilli underneath is bubbling. How long this precisely takes depends on how cold or hot the chilli was when it went into the oven.

9. Let the chilli stand for about 5 minutes once out of the oven before cutting the top into squares or slices to serve with a helping of chilli underneath.

10. And alongside this chilli, you can dollop out guacamole, some cool sour cream and grated cheese. And if you like things a little more spicy, toss some pickled jalapeno slices on top. Guaranteed to warm your insides up!

NOTE: *You can easily double the recipe for the Chilli Con Carne and pop it in a deeper dish the topping will still be plenty!*

GOLDEN SYRUP DUMPLINGS

Serves 4

GOLDEN SYRUP DUMPLINGS

1 cup Self Raising Flour
Sea salt, to taste
20g Butter

1 lge Egg
50ml Milk

SAUCE

1/2 cup Golden Syrup
3/4 cup Brown Sugar firmly packed
30g Butter
1 & 2/3 cup Water

1 Sift the self-raising our into a bowl and add a pinch of salt.

2 Rub the butter into the our until it resembles breadcrumbs, add the whisked egg and stir to combine.

3 Gently add the milk and mix till the dough just comes together and resembles a scone mix, be sure not to overwork the dough.

Set aside.

4 Combine all sauce ingredients into a large fry pan. Bring to the boil to amalgamate before reducing heat to a gentle simmer.

5 Flour your hands and roll the dough into the size of a 20c piece. Place the balls onto a tray lined with baking paper.

6 Slip the balls off the baking paper altogether into the syrup. Cover fry pan with foil to form a tight seal and cover with the lid.

Cook for about 10 minutes before turning over to cook for another 10 minutes on the other side.

7 Remove with a slotted spoon and serve with your favourite accompaniment ice cream or cream... Up to you!

NOTE: *Double of quadruple this recipe if you like it works amazing and lasts covered in the fridge for a good couple of days!*

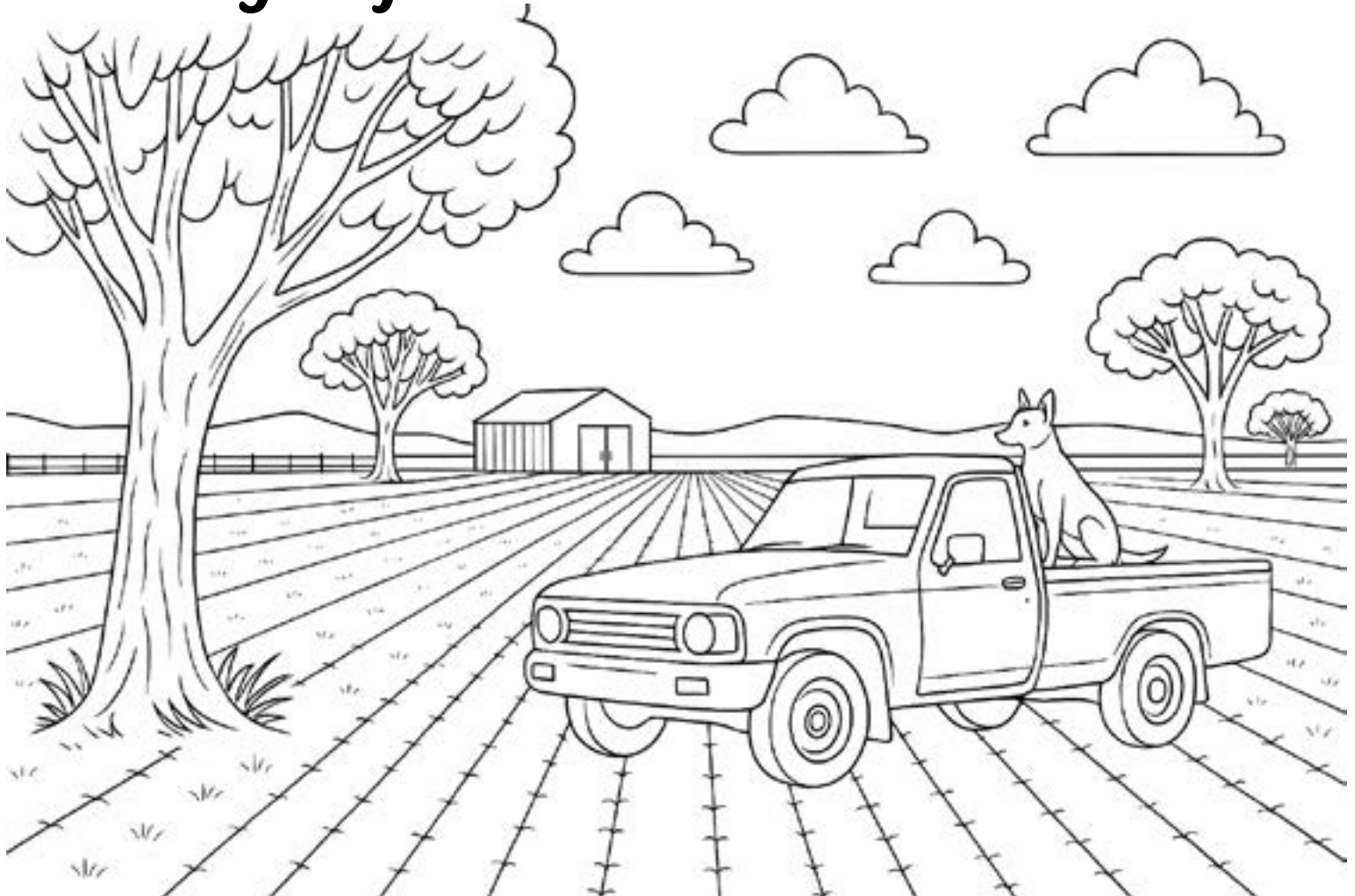

12 Chair Yoga Poses

Circles
Circle your hips clockwise 5 times while seated without moving your upper body, then counterclockwise 5 times. Repeat five times.

Sun Salutation Arms
Sitting tall, breathe in and lift your arms up pressing your palms overhead. On an exhale, float the arms back down to your sides. Repeat 5 times.

Sun Salutations with Twists
Repeat the previous exercise, adding a twist as you exhale. Repeat five times on each side, holding the last twist for 5 seconds.

High Alter Side Leans
Lift your arms and interlace your fingers together in front of you. Then turn your palms to the ceiling as you straighten your arms above your head. Lean to the right for 3 breaths, then to the left for 3.

Uddiyani Breathing
Sit up tall at the edge of your seat and place your hands on your wrists. Take a deep breath in through the nose, expanding through your sides & abdomen, then exhale slowly. Repeat for 10 breaths.

Cat/Cow
Inhale and arch your back to look up at the ceiling. Exhale through your spine, pulling your

Eagle Arms
Stretch your arms out to each side. Next, bring one arm under the arm under the other in front of you at shoulder height. While bending your arms at the elbows, twist your arms so that your palms meet each other. Hold for 5 breaths, then unwind & repeat with the opposite arm on top.

Assisted Neck Stretches
Take your right arm and drape it over your head until your palm reaches your left ear. Let your head fall to your right shoulder, & hold for 5 breaths. Repeat on the opposite side.

Goddess with a Twist
Open your legs wide and point your toes out. Place your right arm inside your right leg, reaching toward the floor. Lift your left arm toward the ceiling & bring your gaze up to your left palm. Hold for 5 breaths, then repeat on the opposite side.

Ankle to Knee
Sit up straight, bend your right knee and place your right ankle over your left knee. For a deeper stretch, lean forward. Hold for 5 breaths, then repeat on the opposite side.

Warrior 2
Sit tall at the edge of your seat. Bend your right knee to the side & stretch your left leg out behind you as you press down through your outer heel. Hold for 5 breaths, then repeat on the opposite side.

Forward Fold
Sit tall and straight. Then, fold down over your legs, letting your head, neck & body hang limp. Hold for as long as you want before rolling back up to a sitting position.
