Rural and Regional Liberals Demand Action on Working Holiday Visa Delays Farmers face growing uncertainty ahead of harvest as regional workforce concerns intensify

The Federal Parliamentary Rural and Regional Liberals, chaired by the Federal Member for O'Connor, Rick Wilson MP, are calling on the Albanese Government to urgently address growing concerns over delays and uncertainty in the Working Holiday Maker visa program, warning the consequences could be felt across agriculture, tourism and regional communities nationwide.

Regional Liberal MPs say farmers and business owners are increasingly contacting their local federal representatives concerned that backpackers they were expecting to arrive for harvest and summer work may not arrive in time, or at all.

The committee said confidence in the system was rapidly eroding.

"Across regional Australia, growers are telling us they are anxious about where their workforce is going to come from this harvest."

"Many of these workers are experienced agricultural workers, including many young Europeans who play an important role in helping producers get crops off the ground and into export markets."

The Rural and Regional Liberals are concerned by reports that Working Holiday Maker (WHM) visa applications have slowed significantly following changes affecting applicants from 24 countries and the apparent de-prioritisation of some visa streams.

This follows a directive from the Minister for Home Affairs and Immigration, Tony Burke, in August who confirmed that WHM visas were being handled "more slowly than they were previously" but failed to provide further information about the reason for the slowdown.

Businesses and prospective workers alike have been left frustrated by a lack of clarity around processing arrangements, with many reporting application timeframes far longer than those historically experienced. MPs have also been approached by growers concerned that, as far as they can determine, approvals for Subclass 417 Working Holiday Maker visas have slowed dramatically since July.

The committee said farmers need certainty ahead of one of the most important periods of the agricultural calendar.

"We are hearing concerns from right across regional Australia that workers who would previously have received visa approvals relatively quickly are now facing lengthy delays and uncertainty."

"The Government needs to explain what has changed, what resources are being allocated to processing these applications and what steps are being taken to ensure businesses can access workers before harvest gets underway."

The concerns come at a time when farmers are already grappling with rising input costs, ongoing labour shortages, biosecurity challenges, increased regulation and seasonal pressures.

The committee said the issue had been compounded by Labor's decision to abolish the Agriculture Visa introduced by the former Coalition Government.

"The Coalition recognised that regional Australia faces unique workforce challenges and sought to create a dedicated pathway to support the agricultural sector."

"That pathway was scrapped, and now farmers are once again facing uncertainty about whether they will have the workers they need when they need them."

The impact extends well beyond agriculture.

Working Holiday Makers are a major source of labour for hospitality, tourism and retail businesses throughout regional Australia, particularly during the busy summer period when coastal communities experience a significant influx of visitors.

"These workers don't just help bring in harvests. They work in cafes, restaurants, shops, accommodation providers and tourism businesses that keep regional communities vibrant."

"At the same time, they spend money locally, support small businesses and contribute to the economic life of the towns they call home during their stay."

The committee said regional Australia was not asking for special treatment, but for a Government that understands what is at stake.

"The industries sounding the alarm today are the same industries that help power the Australian economy."

"Our grain sector alone is worth between \$21 billion and \$27 billion annually and produces an average of around 64 million tonnes of grain each year. It is one of Australia's great export success stories and a pillar of regional prosperity."

"Alongside agriculture, Australia's world-class tourism industry relies on seasonal workers to support the small businesses, hospitality venues and tourism operators that welcome millions of visitors to regional communities every year."

"Yet while farmers prepare for harvest and regional businesses prepare for the summer tourism season, they are being left in the dark about whether the workforce they depend on will be allowed to enter the country in time."

"The Minister must come clean on the impact of changes affecting applicants from 24 countries, explain the apparent de-prioritisation of Working Holiday Maker visas, and outline what action is being taken to ensure regional industries are not left short of workers."

"The Coalition's Agriculture Visa recognised that regional Australia has unique workforce needs. Labor scrapped that solution and now owes farmers and regional businesses an explanation."

"The choice for the Government is simple: back regional Australia or risk undermining the industries that feed the nation, generate billions in export earnings and support thousands of jobs."

"Minister, it's time to back the farmers who grow our food, the businesses that keep regional communities alive and the tourism operators who showcase the best of Australia to the world."

"Back regional Australia before harvest begins. The economic consequences of getting this wrong will be felt far beyond the farm gate."

We've been out and about in neighbouring towns, assisting other local police with matters as they have arisen.

Responding to a District request Kulin Police travelled to Wagin to assist in the search for an elderly male Missing Person. Unfortunately, he was not found and our thoughts are with the family and friends of the gentleman.

Kulin Police apprehended a male person in Corrigin wanted for an outstanding warrant in Corrigin. They were then conveyed to Narrogin for court by Corrigin Police.

The following day, after a driver, stopped by Corrigin Police, tested positive to driving with a Prescribed Illicit Drug (cocaine), Kulin Police searched the suspects' vehicle, locating cocaine, cannabis and stolen credit cards hidden in the boot of the vehicle – As a result the offender has an upcoming court date and may be further charged with a driving offence, pending results from the ChemCentre WA.

On another note.....Parents, Guardians, Responsible persons and other adults. Kulin Police have been made aware that some Juveniles are consuming alcohol on Licenced Premises and at public gatherings – IT IS STRICLY PROHIBITED.

Liquor Control Act 1988

123. Possession or consumption of liquor by juveniles: offences

(1) Subject to this Act, where a juvenile —

(a) purchases or obtains, or attempts to purchase or obtain, liquor from any other person on licensed or regulated premises; or

(b) brings liquor on to licensed or regulated premises; or

(c) consumes liquor on licensed or regulated premises, the juvenile commits an offence.

Penalty for this subsection: a fine of \$3 000.

(2) Without limiting section 119, a juvenile who has any liquor in his or her possession or control in any place or on any premises to which the public is permitted to have access, whether on payment of a charge or otherwise, commits an offence.

Penalty for this subsection: a fine of \$3 000

Be aware, the Licenced Premises may not see or be alerted the Juvenile is consuming alcohol but if a Juvenile is reported, or caught in the act, **the Licenced Premises Licence MAY BE SUSPENDED and the Bar staff and Licence Holder/s may be fined** – Please prevent this from happening, its YOUR community, YOUR premises, YOUR place to go.

DO NOT SUPPLY/PROVIDE ALCOHOL or ALLOW JUVENILIES to have/consume alcohol

Lithium-ion batteries are a major cause of fires across Western Australia, with firefighters responding to more than three battery-related incidents each week.

This winter, DFES has launched an advertising campaign to better inform Western Australians about the risks posed by lithium-ion batteries and how to buy, store and use them safely.

Lithium-ion batteries have become increasingly prevalent in our everyday lives. They are found in a wide range of household and recreational products including e-scooters, e-bikes, power banks, mobile phones, tablets, laptops, headphones, power tools, electric toothbrushes, cordless vacuums, cameras and even children's toys.

Department of Fire and Emergency Services Commissioner Darren Klemm AFSM said while lithium-ion battery technology had its benefits, there were also risks Western Australians needed to be aware of to stay safer.

"Through this campaign, DFES is encouraging the public to take some simple precautions when buying, storing and using products containing lithium-ion batteries," he said.

Lithium-ion battery safety checklist:

- Only purchase and use devices and equipment from reputable manufacturers and suppliers. Choosing quality products, rather than damaged or end-of-life second-hand items, is critical to reducing the risk of battery-related fires.
- Regularly check batteries (active batteries and not-in-use batteries in storage) for signs of physical damage or overheating.
- Avoid leaving batteries on charge for extended periods or unattended, particularly near flammable materials.
- Dispose of batteries correctly through appropriate recycling or disposal facilities.
- In the event of an incident, stay well clear and call 000 immediately. Lithium-ion battery fires can be explosive and include thermal runaway.

Trust the Signs, Trust your Gut & Ask R U OK?

**It's time to ask R U OK? if you notice a change,
no matter how small.**

WHAT ARE THEY SAYING?

Do they seem:

- Confused or irrational
- Moody
- Unable to switch off
- Concerned about the future
- Concerned they're a burden
- Lonely or lacking self-esteem
- Concerned they're trapped or in pain

WHAT ARE THEY DOING

Are they:

- Experiencing mood swings
- Becoming withdrawn
- Changing their online behaviour
- Losing interest in what they used to love
- Unable to concentrate
- Less interested in their appearance and personal hygiene
- Behaving recklessly
- Changing their sleep patterns

WHAT'S GOING ON IN THEIR LIFE

Are they experiencing:

- Relationship issues
- Major health issues
- Work pressure or constant stress
- Financial difficulty
- Loss of someone or something they care about



R U OK?™

Starting a conversation



1. Ask R U OK?

- Pick the right time and place to start the conversation.
- Mention specific things that have made you concerned for them, like "You seem less chatty than usual. How are you going?"



2. Listen

- Take what they say seriously and don't interrupt or rush the conversation.
- Encourage them to explain: "How are you feeling about that?" or "How long have you felt that way?"
- Show that you're listening by repeating back what you've heard (in your own words) and ask if you've understood them properly.



3. Encourage action

- Help them think of next steps they could take to help them manage their situation.
- If they've been down for more than two weeks, encourage them to see a health professional.
- Be positive about the role of professionals in getting through tough times.



4. Check in

- Schedule a reminder to call them in a couple of weeks. If they're really struggling, follow up with them sooner.
- Stay in touch and be there for them. Genuine care and concern can make a real difference.

Science Week 17/08-21/08

Hypothesis, observation and ideas. Science week was filled with special little experiments planned and prepared by our Educators.

Experiences such as the below provide not only an opportunity for learning but a chance for us to hear what the children think might happen or change during the activity. Capturing the children's observations, comments, ideas, and hypothesis helps us understand what they are learning.

Our Educators can scaffold this learning by watching the children and asking open ended questions.

What do you think might happen? What colour is it? What does it look like now? How does that feel on your hands? Why did that happen?

Water sucking candle

Demonstration of air pressure. The change in air temperature inside the glass decreases pressure which then results in the water being drawn into the glass from the tray.

Children's comments

Touching water in the tray, wondering why we needed blu tac to keep the candle upright, voicing safety over using the lighter, voicing the sight of the water going up in the jar.



Rain Experiment

We used water shaving cream to demonstrate rain forming in a cloud. Learnt from this is how clouds are formed through evaporative moisture from the ground which collects in the clouds and when too heavy the rain falls.

Children's comments

It's blue, I see it falling, it looks pink (reflection from tray through jug), it feels slippery.



Coloured vinegar and Bi Carb trays

In these trays we viewed the reaction of an alkaline base reacting with an acidic liquid which creates a carbon dioxide gas (very exciting bubbly reaction). Our children enjoyed these trays for some time completely immersed in the tactile function using first their pipettes then their hands to mix and create.

Children's comments

It's bubbling, I see a different colour here, my hands are orange, I'm going to use my hands to mix, why isn't mine bubbling now? (alkaline all used)

Spring in the Garden

Sunshine, seedlings & a little forward planning

Spring has arrived, and a few warm days are all it takes to make me wildly optimistic about the garden. Suddenly I'm picturing overflowing veggie beds, armfuls of flowers and tomatoes picked warm from the vine.

Spring, me has enormous confidence in January, me.

Before we race out and plant everything though, I've been doing a little reading. The Diggers Club recommends waiting for warmer soil and the risk of frost to pass before planting out many of our tender summer favourites. Here in Kulin, it pays to watch the weather rather than simply trust the calendar. There is still plenty to get growing now, and tomatoes, capsicum, chilli, eggplant, basil and the cucurbit gang can be started somewhere warm and protected, ready to go in the ground when conditions are right. Check out our Spring Planting Guide on the next page for plenty more ideas.

Survival of the Prettiest

Who says a garden tough enough for a Wheatbelt summer can't also be beautiful? Diggers suggests plenty of colourful drought-tolerant choices, including salvias, lavender, gaura and pelargoniums, while cosmos and zinnias bring colourful. Mix flowers and herbs through the veggie patch too and the bees will thank you for it. Rather than asking "Can I grow this in Kulin?", perhaps ask "Where in my garden could this be happy?" That lovely sunny September spot might be considerably less friendly on a 40-degree January afternoon.

Do January, You a Favour

Now is the time for a little forward planning. Add some compost, give the garden a good drink and mulch before the heat arrives. And check the retic! Turn it on and actually walk around. Find the blocked dripper, buried sprinkler or mysterious section watering nothing but the driveway now, rather than on the first 40-degree day.

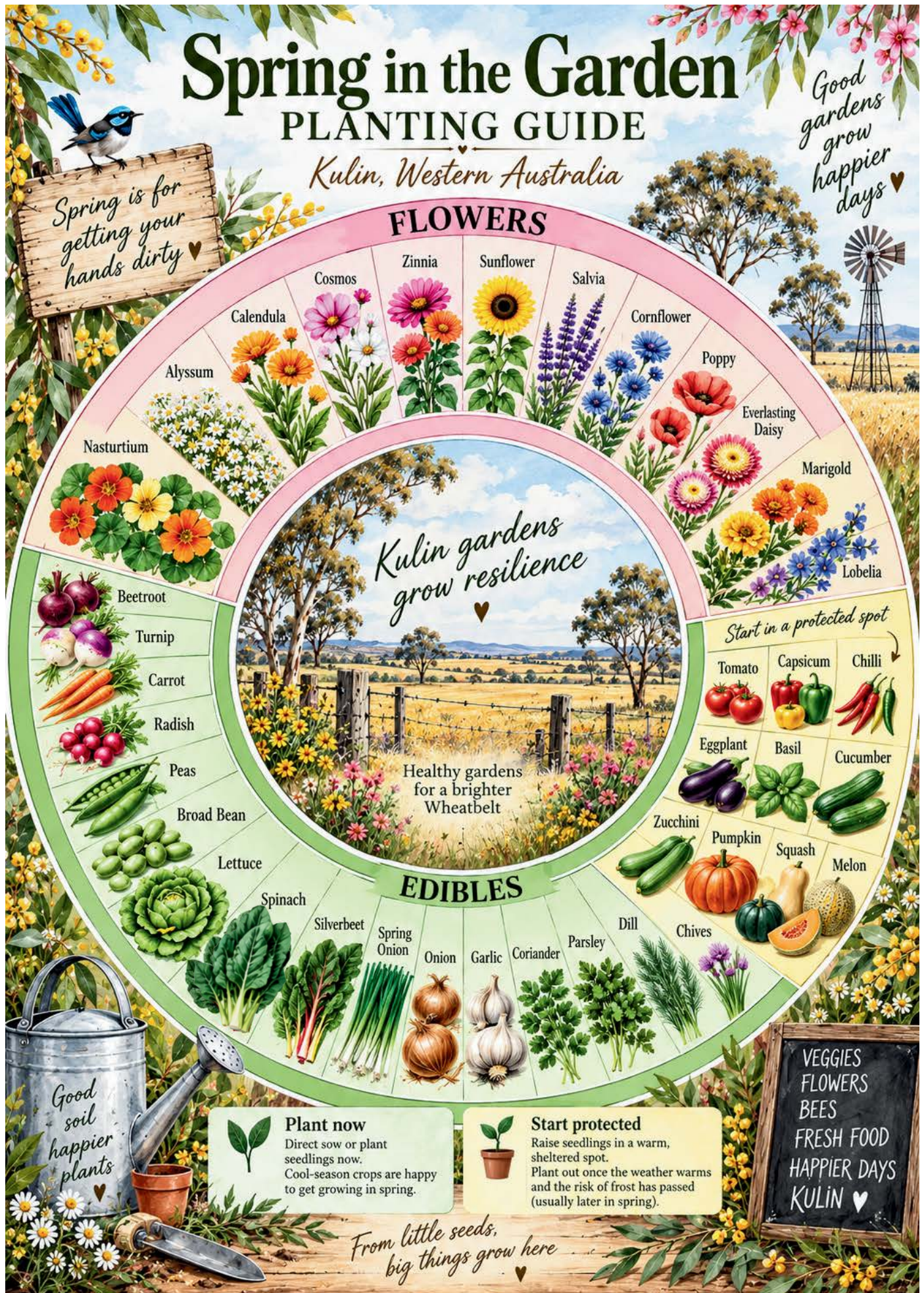

THE RECIPE THAT GOT AWAY



As we gear up for another Bush Races in Kulin and the Busy Bees move into top gear, my oven gets another workout. It's a parade of slices and biscuits, keeping family and community fed as we put together all the work behind the show that takes Kulin by storm each year.

And while thinking about what slices to make this year, there was one in particular I really wanted to try.

Growing up, there were a few staple treats that made the rounds in our family. Seeding, shearing, harvest, chaff cutting... whatever was happening, you could guarantee there would be plenty of delicious things to keep everyone fed. Scones of every kind, from cheese and pumpkin to the traditional; biscuits by the dozen; and slices galore.

There were always a few favourites you could count on. Weetbix slice was one. Apricot yoghurt slice was another. And then there was Granny's Date and Walnut

Slice with Coffee Icing.

That slice has become something of a family mystery.

No one can find the recipe written down anywhere. It's one we still talk about, remember and practically lick our lips thinking about, but 23 years after saying our farewells, Granny is apparently still keeping that particular secret.

So, I decided it was time to have a go.

This is my first attempt at recreating something I remember incredibly fondly. My version of Granny's Slice. It's not exactly as I remember it, and perhaps it never could be. Memories made with people we love have a way of becoming about far more than just how something tasted.

But it's pretty darn good nonetheless.

As I made it the other

day, I even pulled out my own little piece of Granny's history: a spoon I was gifted from her set and one known in our family simply as Granny's magic spoon. As I gently spread the thick mixture across the tin with the back of it, I could almost hear her beside me:

"Gently, Kirri-Girl. Press it gently. Don't squash it."

The oven isn't the old Metters anymore, keeping the house cosy while something delicious cooks away inside, but standing in my own kitchen, using her spoon and making this slice for my own family and friends, I felt pretty happy with where we'd landed.

And the consensus from the family and the Bush Races Busy Bee taste-testing crew?

Second helpings, ASAP.

So, with that endorsement, I'd like to share my version of Granny's Slice with you. A little bit of an old family memory, recreated in my kitchen and passed around the table once again.

From my table to yours, enjoy a little sweetness for the soul... and call it energy for Busy Bee season!

Bring on spring and another Kulin Bush Races.

COFFEE, DATE & WALNUT SLICE

Makes: Approx. 40 pieces

Tins: Two 20 × 30 cm slice tins

Oven: 160°C conventional / 150°C fan-forced

Bake: Start checking at 25 minutes

INGREDIENTS

Coffee, Date & Walnut Slice

- 250 g butter, softened (1 cup)
- 220 g soft brown sugar (1 cup, lightly packed)
- 1/4 cup golden syrup (4 tbsp)
- 2 large eggs
- 2 cups chopped pitted dates (approx. 320 g)
- 1 1/2 cups walnut halves (approx. 180 g)
- 3 cups plain flour (approx. 450 g)
- 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 4 tsp cocoa powder
- 2 tsp instant coffee
- 3/4 cup milk, added gradually

Soft Coffee Icing

- 100 g butter, softened
- 4 cups icing sugar, sifted
- 4 tsp instant coffee
- 3 tbsp boiling water
- 2–4 tbsp milk, as needed

METHOD

1. Toast the Walnuts.

Preheat the oven to 160°C conventional or 150°C fan-forced.

Spread the walnuts over a baking tray and toast for 8–10 minutes, until fragrant and just beginning to deepen in colour.

Cool, then roughly chop. Leave plenty of identifiable pieces rather than chopping them too finely.

2. Make the Slice.

Grease and line two 20 × 30 cm slice tins.

Beat the softened butter and brown sugar until creamy, smooth and slightly lighter in colour.

Don't beat until very pale and fluffy. We want some aeration, but we're making a close-textured slice rather than cake.

Add the golden syrup and beat until combined.

Add the eggs one at a time, beating until incorporated.

Stir through the chopped dates and toasted walnuts.

Sift together the flour, bicarbonate of soda and cocoa.

Dissolve the instant coffee in 2 tablespoons of the milk.

Fold the dry ingredients through the butter mixture, adding the dissolved coffee and enough additional milk to produce a thick, soft mixture.

Do not automatically add the full 3/4 cup of milk.

The mixture should hold its shape when spooned into the tin but yield easily under the back of a spoon. It should neither pour like cake batter nor require pressing like biscuit dough.

3. Spread Gently.

Divide evenly between the prepared tins.

Using the back of a large spoon, gently coax the mixture toward the edges and smooth the surface.

Be gentle. Smooth it into place rather than pressing or compacting it.

4. Bake – Gently!

Bake at 160°C conventional / 150°C fan forced.

Set a timer for 30 minutes.

At 30 minutes, check the centre.

The slice is ready when: the surface is set and lightly golden, the centre feels set but still

slightly tender when gently pressed, the very edges are only just beginning to pull away from the tin, a skewer inserted into the centre has moist crumbs attached but no wet batter.

If it isn't ready at 30 minutes, return it to the oven for 5 minutes at a time, checking between each interval.

Do not wait for a completely dry skewer. The residual heat of the tin will continue cooking the slice after it leaves the oven. Leave it in the tin to cool completely.

5. Make the Soft Coffee Icing.

Dissolve the instant coffee in the boiling water and allow to cool slightly.

Beat the softened butter until smooth.

Gradually mix in the sifted icing sugar, followed by the dissolved coffee.

Add milk gradually until the icing is soft, smooth and easily spreadable.

We're looking for traditional soft slice icing, not fluffy buttercream and not a runny glaze. Spread generously over the completely cold slice. Allow the icing to develop a delicate crust before cutting.

6. Cut.

Cut each tray into approximately 20 generous rectangles.

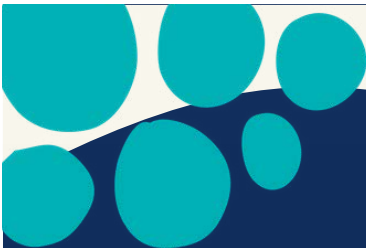
