With a run of warm weather, it's good to see that harvest is in full swing. The roads are busy with trucks, travelers and school pick-ups. A gentle reminder to be patient on the roads and get home safely!

Last week Shire staff visited The Mug Movement Café at Kulin District High School. The coffee was hot, the food was delicious and the service great too. The Specialist Program offered at KDHS, with support from Kulin Community Bank, is a fantastic initiative. It is great to see the students engaged in their chosen subjects and we certainly enjoyed the morning tea.

This week the CRC/Shire hosted the Seniors Christmas Party. A strong crowd of 50 people attended and enjoyed a beautiful Christmas lunch prepared by Acres of Taste. The group were entertained by Kulin District High School Year 1&2 students who sang beautiful Christmas carols which added a wonderful atmosphere to the event. Congratulations to Belle, Stella and Taryn, Caroline and Jamie for organizing the event which celebrates our seniors and recognizes their contribution to our community.

More Christmas festivities are happening in town over the next few weeks. It will be a great opportunity to catch up with friends and family and enjoy our community events. Works are progressing nicely down on the Fence Rd with 90% of the bitumen now ripped up and gravel being carted in sections now preparing for the final stages of reconstruction. The section between Muller Road and Harrismith Road will start to be ripped in the coming days with the plan being to get this section bitumised in early February 2023. There will continue to be long sections of gravel throughout the reconstruction of the road and we ask road users to take care travelling through these parts as visibility can be low at times. We will do our best to minimise the dust where possible.

Jitarning Dudinin Road will be bitumised on Monday 12th and Tuesday 13th of December and delays can be expected at times through this section. Signs and guideposts will be installed after bitumising, and this will be completed before Christmas.

With harvest in full swing, we know there are going to be roads requiring grading, however we ask for patience as we try to balance the workload between construction works and grading. If you know or have anybody looking for some casual work, please get in contact as we would greatly appreciate the extra operators on the roads crew. Please report any concerns direct to Judd Hobson.

The final Council Meeting for 2022 has been moved to Tuesday 20th December 2022. Shire Administration will close for the Christmas/New Year period at 4.30pm Thursday 22nd December and reopen 8.30am Tuesday 3rd January

2023. Shire staff will monitoring weather conditions during this time with respect to Harvest and Vehicle Movement Bans. Please call the Harvest Ban Line - 9880 1511 for up to date information and make sure you are subscribed to the SMS Harvest Ban alert group.

As this is the last full version of the Kulin Update for 2022 I take the opportunity to wish everyone a safe and happy Christmas, successful harvest, Happy New Year and happy holidays.

KDHS SPECIALIST PROGRAM

November 28th-30th was an exciting time for the KDHS students, with the specialist program rolling around again, an end of semester tradition. This specialist program contained three options for students: Barista and marketing program, squash, and 'junk art' - which consisted of welding. We spoke to some of the students and facilitators to see their thoughts on the program.

Barista and marketing- facilitated by Daniela Varone and Gen Whisson

Daniela mentioned that the specialist program was beneficial for both the facilitators and the students, as it not only taught them new skills, but also allowed her to see how savvy they were. Daniela started graphic design in 2005, and mentioned that the best part of the job was being able to design for local businesses in the country. The students in this program first learnt all about the art of coffee making, then on the second day, were responsible for choosing a name for their cafe, making and presenting a brief for their vision of the cafe. A name was decided for the cafe, logos were designed, and all of a sudden "The Mug Movement" was open and running.

Maggie, Lisa and Teagan were three of our talented cafe owners, they talked to me about all the new skills they had learnt: how to make a great coffee, all the best barista skills, customer service skills, and the ins and outs of graphic design. Their favourite activities included making their mood boards and using their new skills to create a real life cafe, and seeing it come to life. Grateful for the experience, the girls mentioned how happy they were that they would be able to use the skills in future, to get a job or to be able to help others out. Teagan expressed that it was a really, really fun experience, and that they were all privileged to get real work experience that would help them be ready for the work force.

Toby and Isaac told me all about how they learnt to weld, and how they had learnt the important skill that seems to be unknown to their demographic- patience and taking your time. Their favourite part was being given the opportunity to make some really cool and unique things that they were allowed to take home, these included a firepit, kangaroo, flowers, fish and dogs. A couple of the students in the program mentioned how they were excited to be able to use the skills they had learnt outside of the program, such as on the farm or in their future workplace.

KDHS SPECIALIST PROGRAM

Squash- Facilitated by Mike Cornish

Squash was a big success- judging by the smell of sweat that wafted through the Shire offices. The squash students told me all about the different types of shots they learnt, and how now they properly knew all the rules of the game. This new knowledge of the rules meant that they could be squash superstars in the future, and were excited to be able to play more. The tournament was a big highlight, and everyone said they were big fans of Mike.



I also spoke to Tom Murphy from Rural Bank. Rural Bank is involved as they sponsor the specialist program, allowing all the students the opportunity to learn new skills and experience new things.

“The SSP is important to our community in many ways. It upskills our kids and gives them a chance to try things not normally available in Kulin. They may discover their future career path, their lifelong hobby or just as importantly it may make them realise what they don’t want to do!

It also has the capacity to keep our kids in the high school for longer. This in turn will benefit our sporting teams and our community in general.”

Why the bank likes to be involved?

“I guess the quick answer to this is that we are a community bank and that anything that will benefit our community is of interest to us. The beauty of community banking is that the more successful we are, the more we can invest in the communities that support us. If this means \$20k per year into the SSP and that allows our school to remain strong, then it is a wise investment in the future of our community.”

How can it benefit the community/people involved?

“Again, upskilling the future of our community will benefit us all. We have always been a town that uses the wide range of skills we have and if we can light the spark for our next engineer, artist, etc then our community will continue to be strong.”

“Seeing the engagement of the participants is always a thrill. Not all of us are built for sitting in a classroom (myself included) so for our kids to have an opportunity to get out and about or into our amazing “blue shed” and learn some real-life skills is great to see.

Another observation is that the students create a bond over the three days with whoever is running the activity. If the person running the activity is local but may not have kids at the school, it can create relationships that will last for many years. This is just another way it can strengthen our community.

The Kulin Community Bank would like to thank KDHS for involving us in what is always a high point of our year. We love seeing kids engaged, learning and happy, knowing that it may be helping them in the future is the icing on the cake.

A special mention needs to go to Megan Syred who coordinates the SSP. There is a lot of work that goes into six days of activities per year and for that we are very grateful. Our kids are very lucky!

If anyone has any hidden skills or talents that they think will benefit our kids, feel free to contact myself or Megan to see if it can work.”

LOCAL SUPERSTARS- GEN WHISSON

Gen Whisson is a member of our community I am sure you all are familiar with, however, as you will read, Gen has had some amazing life experiences and careers that I believe are inspirational to not only me, but to everyone around her.

Gen grew up in Lake Grace, did school there until year 10, then headed off to Narrogin to complete years 11 and 12. After the high school experience was complete, Gen ventured to Perth to begin university. After initially beginning a marine science degree, Gen realised she wanted to return to the country, so marine science may limit her career options if she wished to return to the country. This led to a change in degree to a Bachelor in Science and Environmental Management with a major in freshwater ecosystems.

After graduation, Gen got a job as an Environmental Consultant for a mining company, looking at air pollution and air quality, it was in this job she also learnt how to abseil. While she enjoyed this job, Gen found it very industrial and wanted something more community based. An opportunity came up in Narrogin as a Community Engagement Officer, which entailed helping the community to build the capacity to work on projects of their own regarding environmental protection. Not only did Gen facilitate projects to protect cockatoos, she also helped other endangered and threatened flora and reptile species. This career was not only beneficial for the wildlife that was aided by the projects, but to Gen as well, who was given opportunities to travel all over WA for work. If you weren't already impressed by the dedication to the environment and amazing work Gen has done, you'll

be even more amazed by the fact she was the youngest ever person to be hired by the WWM at that time.

After moving on from the community engagement work, Gen worked as a Salinity Project Officer, looking at helping farmers and groups with where to put their salinity projects. This new career was also based in Narrogin, and was significant to Gen as it involved engaging with the community, a quality of work that she thoroughly enjoyed and sought after.

By far the most intriguing part of Gen's story for me was her work on Rottnest Island as an Interpretation Officer, which required a quick ferry trip to and from the island each day. This involved being part of the Environmental Education team, leading schools and other groups, as well as doing interpretive and experience planning for the coastal walk trail, museum, golf course and many other facilities on the island. Somehow between all this, Gen also led nature education showcases, as well as developing interpretation for the area (the use of communication to help people value an area or destination), she scuba dived and snorkelled to monitor the marine environment, and had time for many other amazing experiences along the way. Not only did Gen learn about the history and heritage of the Island, she also learnt about the Indigenous history of the Island, and made some lifelong friends along the way.

After backpacking around the world for 5 months, Gen resided in Kulin, where she has lived for the past 12 years. After seeing that the Shire was advertising the role of a Project Officer, Gen took the

opportunity and worked on some amazing projects that you may see around our town every day. Working for the Shire for 6 years as a Senior Project Officer, Gen worked on some major projects for our community, such as upgrading the Visitor Discovery Zone, tourism promotion, being involved in the video for Pathways to Wave Rock, promoting the Kulin area and tourism development. All these amazing projects were in addition to being involved in the events "Kulin By Night" and "And Tell Mum". Some of these projects were of enough significance they even won Gen awards at the WA Heritage Awards, as well as earning her the well-deserved David Brand Medal. Since having two gorgeous kids, Gen has been doing freelance work projects, as well as aiding ConsultAg, and doing the sponsorships for the KBR.

Some of Gen's greatest achievements include winning the David Brand Young Achievers medal at the WA tourism awards, as well as being able to do project management for the main street of Kulin, which we can all agree absolutely brought out little town to life. Another massive achievement was the "Kulin by Night" project which won Best Tourism Product at WA Tourism Awards.

When I asked Gen what made her the happiest, the answer was something that I not only found quite beautiful, but it was also genuine and yet still simple: seeing other people happy, seeing people enjoying themselves and belonging to such a positive community were Gen's first answers, but of course, something very relatable, holidays in Dunsborough also made the list.

LOCAL SUPERSTARS- GEN WHISSON

When thinking about what to put in my interview, I wanted to include two final questions to ask to everyone that I had the chance to talk to.

What advice would you give your teenage self?

“My advice would be to not worry too much about the small stuff, as hard as that is. At the time it all feels so big but all of those things when you’re a teenager don’t matter anywhere near as much as you get older. When you get out of school, you can find a group you truly belong to, and can surround yourself with positive people and do all the positive things that make you happy. Being a teenager feels really big and tricky, but it doesn’t last long, just make your own way through life. As hard as it sounds, don’t worry too much about your scores, just try your hardest and don’t worry too much about the future of your career, there are so many options that you might not even know about yet, every experience will lead to something else.”

How do you believe you make the world a better place?

“I believe I have an ability to get along with most people, I try not to get bogged down into politics or other things, I believe I have an ability to get along with people no matter the situation, and always try to see the best in people’s situation.” Gen also added in a message that I know is something that I really needed to hear a few years ago: it doesn’t matter if you’re from a country town, where you go to school, as long as you try your hardest and meet people and make friends, you will be able to achieve whatever you put your mind to.

She added that connections are everything, and that they will get you everywhere, if you are kind and respectful, you never know where you’ll go. People and experiences pop up and it might just be a critical life path for you, don’t be afraid to try new things or put yourself out there.

I really enjoyed my chat to Gen, and I hope it inspired all that get to read it as much as it did me.

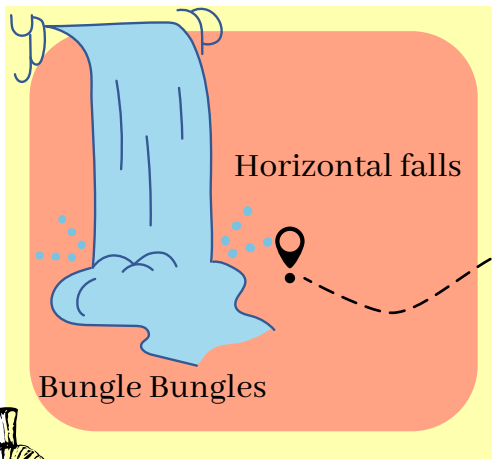

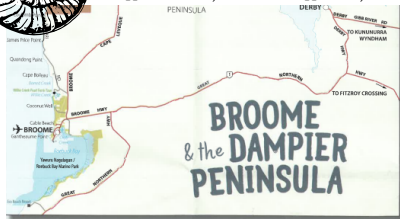

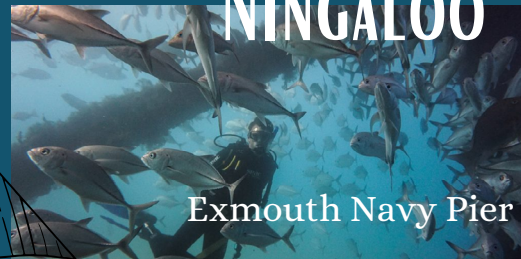

The ladies began the day well, winning 7 out of a possible 8 sets in the singles. Will Cook held up the men's side winning his sets 6-0, 6-0.

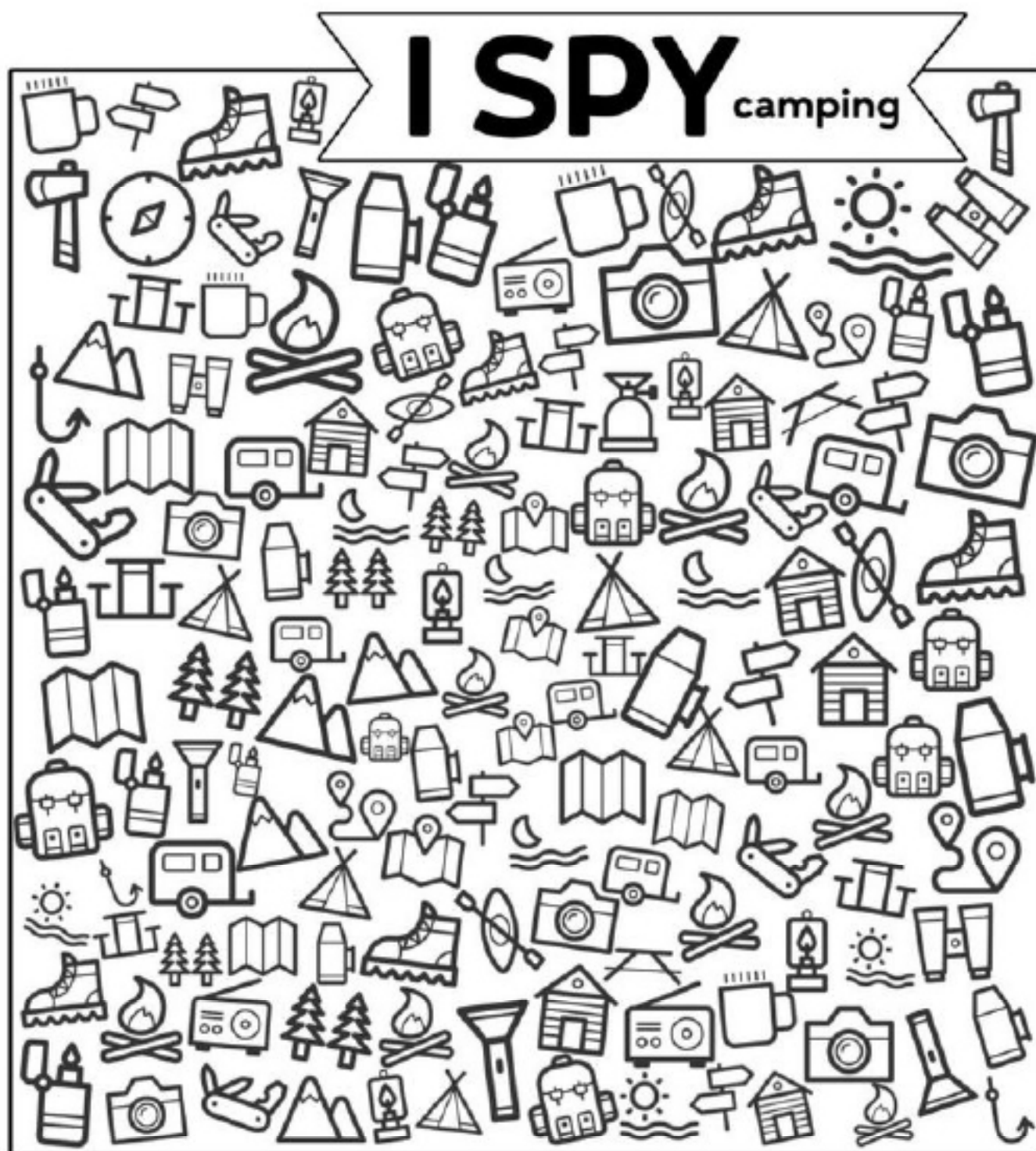

HANDY HINTS FROM THE CRC

GARDENING TIPS FOR THIS SUMMER SCORCHER

Here are our top tips for keeping your garden looking green and gorgeous during these hot summer months.

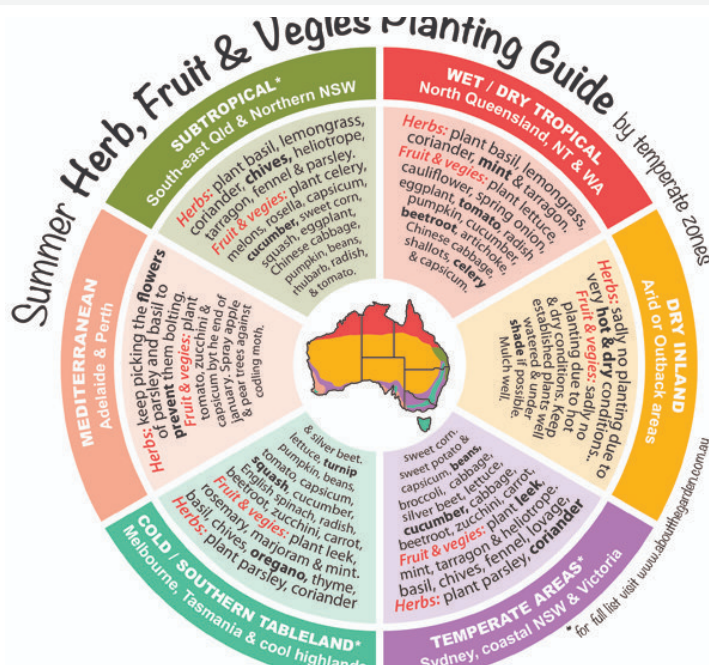
Use plenty of mulch: mulching is vital. Use straw from bales that have been previously used from retaining walls. This way they have started to break down and should be free of any weed seed. Mulch is nature's blanket, keeping soil cool in summer and warm in winter. Hay mulches are more gentle on the soil than bark mulches, and they feed it as they break down, however it does need replacing over time. Spreads it at a depth of 5-10cm thick, working around existing plants.

In the vegie patch, weed before mulching, then add a small amount of fresh, made-compost, tickling it into the soil. This acts like a sponge, allowing your garden soil to hold onto moisture for longer. A thin layer of hay mulch goes on top of this.

Give Your Plants a Good Soak: Before you leave make sure you give everything a deep, long watering and make sure the soil is thoroughly wet. Fruits trees can be soaked by leaving your hose dripping overnight, by which time they should be saturated. Smaller plants in pots can be submerged in a bucket of water till the soil mixture has stopped 'bubbling'; this is a sign all the air bubbles are out of the soil and its really watered thoroughly.

After a long, dry summer, or even patches of hot summer in these regions, plants that have lacked a good water supply are more susceptible to disease and worse, death. In tropical climates, particularly this year, water is not the issue but water getting down into the soil may still be problematic. February can be a good time for the application of a good soil wetting agent. If you are not a fan of soil wetting agents, use a pitchfork to aerate the soil.

This is something that would be useful across the board and definitely will be needed for large, grassed areas. The hot summer sun bakes the soil, causing it to form a crust which reduces the ability for water to sink in. If you are watering your plants and just watching the water run away and not penetrate, you need to either aerate the soil or apply a soil wetting agent. 'Wetta soil' is one I have used and used with great effect.

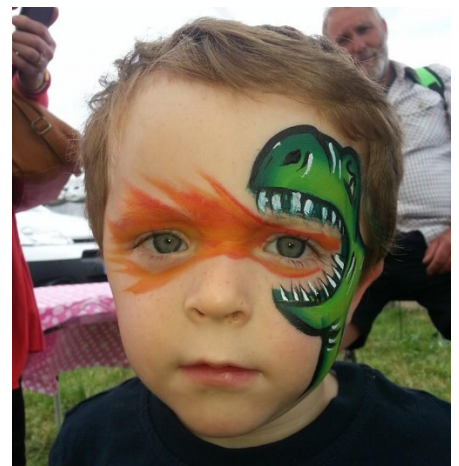
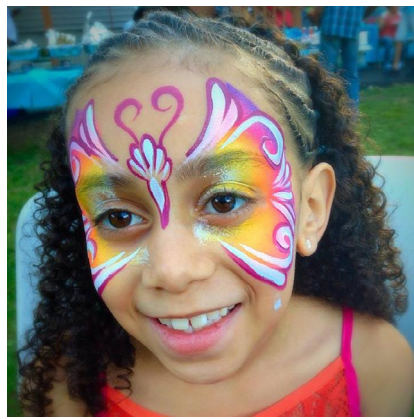

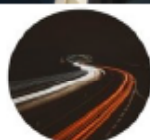
