Proposed Aerial survey for late July, early August, South-West of Kulin

Sultan Resources plan to fly a small helicopter-supported electromagnetic survey over a target some 3.5km SW of Kulin, in an area north and south of the rail line in heavy country. Lines will be around 3 km long, and spaced 100m apart, and the helicopter will need some turning space either side, around 300/500m to turn back on to the next lines. I am contacting all properties in the flight lines, and owners of other properties which will either be encroached by cornering or be close visually.

The Helicopter will fly at around 65m/200ft, the loop is around 18m wide, and is pulled below at a height of 37m/120ft, the helicopter will be travelling between 60-80km/h. The loop will carry an electric current equivalent to a high voltage powerline which is being switched on and off very quickly to help map the geology below the surface. It would be about the same effect as driving under a high-power transmission line if you were to be underneath it. The noise of the helicopter is expected to be less than 80dB at ground level, equivalent to a nearby lawnmover. The helicopter crew will also do some stationary calibrations and checks before and after, but take the helicopter up to 2000ft for that.

The survey will not take any more than half a day. The geophysical contractor has made some arrangements to setup a day prior at the Kulin airstrip, and will breaking the gear down that afternoon or the day after.

KULIN CWA - JANET COLBOURNE

If you haven't seen or heard already, \$267,999.78 has been put back into our community thanks to the Kulin Bush Races. I have been given the privilege to talk to Jan, a member of the Kulin CWA, to give me some insight on what this years Funding Round has done for them.

What Project/s Have You Been Able To Accomplish Due To Funding?

With the sponsorship from Bendigo Bank, CWA has been given an air conditioner which was installed on the 5th of July. This has been a want and a need for a while and Jan has told me that it works beautifully.

Previously the Kulin Bush Races have set out a grant for CWA to replace a window, fly screen and fly screen door. They have also recieved nearly \$10,000 to paint the inside and outside of the CWA building, which is due to commence in the months of August and Spetember 2023. This will hopefully be done before the annual Kulin Bush Races.

What Has The Kulin Bush Races done for Kulin and The Community?

The Kulin Bush Races has brought a lot of people together, which previously hasn't happened alot. Volunteering has been really good and the funding that comes back into the town and community has enabled a lot of good projects. It has definitely put Kulin on the map and encourages other towns to promote their tourist facilities.

What Does The Kulin Bush Races Mean To You?

Jan said that she admires the enthusiasm and initiative, which is such a good look and feeling for the town.

What Has The CWA Done Or Contributed To For The Community?

The rooms in CWA were originally built for women in farming when they came into town. A few examples of the buildings use was to feed their newborns or make a cup of tea, this was the original function of the building. CWA as a body is non-political but work in advocacy for the country people. CWA has always been a respected voice. The building

itself was used for many meetings for all kinds or organisations. It is open for rental and some services that have been held at CWA include commemorations and funerals. CWA was a key part in the drive to get the Kulin Disrtict High School. They also proved bursaries for doctor, nurse, dental and medical students who wish to work in rural areas.


Moving Forward, What Does The CWA Hope To Achieve?

Jan's short answer, to restore the CWA building. CWA is a historic building in which they wish to restore it for public use. A few uses for the building that Jan has mentioned are:

- Small social functions
- Play groups
- A mum and bubs group
- Meetings

KBR 2023 FUNDING ROUND

KULIN RETIREMENT HOMES - ANNIE LEWIS

Continuing on from Kulin CWA, I have decided to interview the Treasurer of the Kulin Retirement Homes, Annie Lewis, who I also get the privilege of working with. Annie has managed the complex and has been apart of the Retirement Homes for 15 years, as well as working for the Kulin Shire for 22 years.

What Current Project Have You Been Able To Accomplish?

The Kulin Retirement Homes have recently obtained a \$44,000 grant from Kulin Bush Races in which they are refurbishing a unit at Kulinda Village.

How Has The Kulin Bush Races Helped The Kulin Retirement Homes?

When the Retirement Homes built the Workman's Estate, Kulin Bush Races, Bendigo Bank and the Kulin Shire contributed to the funding of this project. Without that funding it would not have been possible.

What Has The Kulin Bush Races Done For Kulin And The Community?

For the community, the Kulin Bush Races have funded so many projects which would have been very unlikely for Kulin to obtain without the funding. Kulin Bush Races have brought Kulin as a whole together, with the number of volunteers they get every year. "We are so lucky to be able to put money back into Kulin Distric High School, the Retirement Homes, the Aquatic Centre and so on". Not only have the Kulin Bush Races contributed to Kulin, but they also contribute to surrounding towns. With the number of tourists that come from Perth, Brookton, Corrigin, Narrogin, Kondinin and so on, they tend to keep their towns tidy and roadhouses full. Annie has also had the privilege of building a community house, with funds from Kulin Bush Races. We can thank Greg Hadlow, Wendy Gangell and Annie for this great accomplishment. (This community house also happens to be my family home!).

What Does The Kulin Bush Races Mean To You?

"I could go on for ages. A working community. Anyone could have a passion for netball, footy, hockey and go to those facilities and games, but Kulin Bush Races pulls everyone together for one cause. You may work with people who you only see once a year, or make new friends and meet new people". Annie stated that it is just an overwhelming feeling thinking about what the Kulin Bush Races means to her.

What Has The Kulin Retirement Homes Done Or Contributed To For The Community?

As a Retirement Homes body, they have contributed to the community by offering seniors affordable accommodation, their first aim is to provide for the seniors and aim to have all tenants' seniors. If the Retirement Homes have vacant units and no seniors on a waiting list, they are offered to the wider community. This helps the Retirements homes by having all units filled by tenants. Annie has told me that the seniors love the young tenants' as they make the tenant feel safer, and, of course, they always love new company.

Moving Forward, What Does The Kulin Retirement Homes Hope To Achieve?

The Retirement Homes would love to build another unit at the workman's estate. They currently have 3 units and would hope for a fourth. Kulinda Village offers a 1 or 2 roomed unit while the Workman's Estate offers a unit with 2.5 rooms. Annie receives a lot of feedback about the want for more 2.5 roomed units.

Thank you to Annie for letting me interview her today, I cant wait to do many more interviews over the coming weeks.


SALT DOUGH ORNAMENTS

Attendance

After the last few years where school attendance has been affected negatively by COVID, it is exciting to note our attendance rates at Kulin this semester are quite positive.

Attendance figures at Kulin for Semester 1 at a glance are:

- 65% of our students are regular attendees (have an attendance rate above 90%)
- On any given day we have on average just over 90% of our students at school.
- Only 8% of student absences are unexplained (no communication from home).

Remember if you are not at school you will miss stuff!









COOKING CORNER

CHOCOLATE CARAMEL COOKIES AND PUMPKIN SCONES

Chocolate Caramel Cookies

Ingredients

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/3 cups unsweetened cocoa powder
- 2 tsp baking soda
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 cup unsalted butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 packed light brown sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup buttermilk
- 12oz chocolate
- 36 soft caramels

Method

Step 1

Line baking sheet with parchment paper. In a medium bowl, sift together flour, cocoa powder, baking soda and salt, then whisk to combine; set aside.

Step 2

In a large bowl, using an electric mixer, beat butter and sugars on medium speed until light and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Reduce mixer speed to low and mix in eggs 1 at a time, then add vanilla.

Step 3

Add flour mixture in 2 parts, alternating with buttermilk and beating just until incorporated.

Step 4

Fold in chocolate chunks by hand, then refridgerate at least 30 minutes.

Step 5

Scoop dough into balls (2 tablespoons each) and place on prepared sheet; refridgerate while preparing caramels. With the back of a spoon, flatten each caramel into 3/4 inch wide disk. Flatten each ball of cookie dough into disk and wrap around flattened caramel; return to baking sheet and refridgerate.

Step 6

Heat oven to 350C. Line 2 baking sheets with parchment and arrange chilled cookies on sheets, spacing 2 inches apart. Sprinkle with flaky salt and bake, rotating positions of pans halfway through, until set around edges, 10 to 12 minutes. Let cool on sheets 5 minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

Pumpkin Scones

Ingredients

- 300g butternut pumpkin, peeled and cut into 2cm cubes
- 3 1/2 cups wholemeal self-raising flour
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 3/4 cup reduced fat milk
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Method

Step 1

Preheat oven to 200C. Line a baking tray with baking paper and set aside.

Step 2

Place a pumpkin in a small saucepan with water. Bring to the boil and cook for 15-20 minutes or until pumpkin is

tender.

Step 3

Drain pumpkin and place into a medium-sized bowl. Mash pumpkin and set aside to cool for 10 minutes.

Step 4

Combine self-raising flour, buttermilk and milk into a large mixing bowl. Add pumpkin and nutmeg, working quickly with clean hands to combine all ingredients.

Step 5

Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface. Knead gently until all ingredients are well combined. Be careful not to over knead as this will make your scones touch.

Step 6

Oat dough down until it is 2cm in thickness.

Step 7

Using a 6cm scone cutter, cut rounds and place onto the prepared baking tray.

Step 8

Bake for 12-15 minutes or until scones are golden and well risen.

Step 9

Serve fresh or allow to cool then freeze scones individually in cling wrap, or small airtight containers.





CARAVANNING

1. Make A Checklist

You'll need a comprehensive array of items when holidaying with a caravan. Obviously, a towing aid is required, but you need to select one that is right for your vehicle.

Other essential caravanning items include a fire extinguisher, wheel chocks, caravan jack, sway control device, towing mirrors, extra coolant and oil, a spare fan belt and insulation tape.

As with any hobby, some items are essential for newbies, whole others can be purchased over time for extra comfort and convinience.

2. Ensure Your Caravan Is Safe And Secure

Once armed with the essentials, you'll need to make sure your caravan (and vehicle) is safe to be on the open road. It's best to write a checklist well before you depart and keep it within your caravan for easy referral.

Among necessary checks are that the towing aid is fitted correctly, drawers and other loose items are secure and windows and doors are locked. Also, remove wheel chocks and the jockey wheel, and raise the caravans' steps. It is also essential that the lights of both vehicles and caravan are operational and all tyres are inflated correctly.

3. Take It Easy

No doubt you've been stuck behind a slow-moving caravan. Now it's your turn to irritate other motorists! Naturally towing something the sizes of a bloated elephant takes some getting used to and you should take extra care anyway - yet there is another important consideration - fuel consumption.

4. Have An Early Start

Following on from the tip above, it pays to rise early and hit the road before the crowds join the party. This is especially so when towing a caravan for the first time, as you'll feel much more confident driving in light traffic.

5. Be Prepared For Confined Spaces

No matter the strength of your relationship, a caravanning trip can be a test for you and your partner. One of the top tips for caravanning is to be prepared for the fact that you will be travelling in confined surrounds. Give each other space, where allowable.

6. Work As A Team

When it comes to tips for using a caravan for the first time, one of the biggest of all is how to reverse the darn thing. Practice makes perfect. Put it in training runs before facing an audience at your park.

When at your site, choose the shortest path necessary for reversing. From here, parking a caravan requires you to work as a team.

Ensure you and your partners communication is sound and you can hear others loud and clear. However, consider using hand signals, or even two-way radios, as it might be difficult to hear instructions over a loud engine. Use mirrors, be patient and don't panic.

7. Have A Set-Up Routine

If you've spent considerable time on the road, the last thing you'll want to do is spend hours setting up your site. Once again, a practice run is worthwhile, as the process will become more efficient over time.

As each caravan differs, so too does the setting-up process. However, here's a brief rundown: start by unhitching the

caravan, putting on it's handbrake, and clearing your vehicle away.

Once done, level the caravan, lower all four corner steadies until they are touching the ground, set up the gas and water systems and connect the power. From here, head inside the caravan and check up the power and water supplies: heating, taps, oven, fridge, etc.

8. Don't Take Opinions As Gospel

Having a rig makes you a target to cop advice of fellow caravanners and there's every chance you'll be hit with more opinions than a talkback radio host. In no time, you'll be informed about the best bakery, the cheapest beer and alternative routes that are 'so much quicker'.

9. Pack Up Properly

For this tip, it's best to refer to point number three: follow your checklist. However, there will be additional factors to consider, such as turning off the gas, disconnecting electric and remove water and wastewater supplies.

10. Take A Course

If you're serious about caravanning, you should do it properly. While they might seem excessive, the various 'caravanning for beginners' courses on offer will provide great theoretical and practical advice and boost your confidence. Alternatively, arrange for a caravan specialist to check your rig before you set off.

At the very least, have a trial run with your caravan before beginning an epic journey. It's important to familiarise yourself with your new home away from home.

WORLD YOUTH SKILLS DAY (15TH OF JULY)

Why is World Youth Skills Day Important?

2014, the United Nations General Assembly declared 15 July as World Youth Skills Day, to celebrate the strategic importance of equipping young people with skills for employment, decent work and etrepreneurship. Since then, World Youth Skills Day events have provided a unique opportunity for dialogue between young people, technical and vocational education and training (TVET) institutions, firms, employers' and workers' organisations, policy makers and development partners. Participants have highlighted the ever-increasing significance of skills as the world embarking on a transition towards a sustainable model of development.

What is Youth Skills Day about?

World Youth Skills Day is about equipping young people with the skills needed for decent work, employment and entrepreneurship. It's a significant day for young people, educational institutes and employers alike to come together and ackowledge the importance of helping young people build their skills they need to be employable.

It's vital that all young people know about World youth Skills Day because it's a day that is all about them, their abilities, and their future. The theme for 2020 was 'Skills for Resilient Youth'. This is a theme that is still prevalent this year as Covid-19 still rages across the globe.

What role do technical and vocational education and training play?

In this context, TVET is expected to address the multiple demands of an economic, social and environmental nature by helping youth and adults develop the skills they need for employment, decent work and entrepreneurship, promoting equitable, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, and supporting transitions to green economies and environmental sustainability.

What is the best way to learn new skills?

It may seem difficult to find opportunities when we're in the middle of a pandemic, but there are a bunch of places where you can go online and locally to gain new skills.

1. Your Local Youth Club Or Counselling Centre

Your local council will often have a youth club. Many of these clubs can give you access to staff, councillors or career advisors to help you find ways to build skills that cater to your interests.

Headspace is a counselling service which supports young people. Their website offers resources for employment. Clinics across Australia give you access to councellors who can give you career and education guidance as welll as point out opportunities available in your local area.

2. Consider Taking Up A Traineeship Or Apprenticeship

A traineeship or apprenticeship is a great way to get some hands-on experience in a job. You'll get to develop your skills on the job and in some of these, you can also get paid. A traineeship or apprenticeship can also improve your eployability. You'll have something extra to add to your resume.

Asking for training in the workplace is a great way to build your skillset while working. Workplace training has mutual benefits for both employers and employees alike. For employers, training can improve efficiency, employee morale and organisational effectiveness. As an employee, you get to develop your skills and learn alongside your fellow colleagues.

4. Using Youth Employment Services






