# PROPERTY UPKEEP

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations monthly during fire season.

- Cut the grass around your property to 10cm or less.
- Prune shrubs so they are not dense.
- Ensure gas cylinders are chained/secured upright.
- Check gas release valves face away from property.
- Clean gutters.

# RURAL PROTECTION

Complete these preparations if you own a rural property.

- Make sure fire trucks can access and turn around on your property.
- Check bridge loading and cattle grid loading for fire truck access.
- Create fire breaks along paddock boundaries.
- Store petrol and gas safely.
- Install underground water pumps that lead from dams to the house.
- If a fire threatens, move livestock to a well grazed paddock.
- Check generator and pumps are working.

# LASTING PROTECTION

Set calendar reminders to complete these preparations annually.

- Keep gas cylinders away from likely direction of fire (i.e. where bush is) and turn release valves outwards.
- Remove shrubs, wood, mulch or any flammable material, against or near the house.
- Block any gaps under floor, in the roof spaces, under eaves, external vents, skylights, chimneys and wall claddings.
- Install metal fly wire mesh on all windows, vents and install a protective screen on evaporative air conditioner.
- Create a mineral earth firebreak along the boundary of your property.
- Install a fire or heat radiant shield such as a solid fence.

### **Bushfires**

It doesn't matter if you're staying

or leaving, there are some important yet simple things you can do to help protect your home from fire.

- Cut the grass around your property to 10cm or less.
- Prune thick shrubs or remove any vegetation from against your home, create a minimum 2cm gap between your house and tree branches.
- Move any wood, mulch, or flammable materials away from the outside of the house.
- Clean the gutters of your house.

- Check gas bottle release valves face outwards away from property.
- Larger properties need to create firebreaks along all boundaries of their property suitable for fire truck access. To fund out if your property is legally required to have a fire break, contact your local government.
- Install a protective screen on your evaporative air conditioner.
- Install metal fly mesh on all windows and vents.

### **VANISHING**

### **SKYE MCNAUGHTON**

I practically throw myself into the doorway of Sophie's tiny room. The rising sunlight through the frosted windows reveals my 10-year-old sister's silhouette. I go back to my crammed bedroom and collapse onto my worn-down mattress in relief. She was safe for another month, she wasn't one of them, she wasn't a forgetter. Not yet at least. We have something here in WoodsCreek. Every month one boy and one girl disappear, into nowhere. No one really knows where they go, but how can they? It's not like there are any clues, no signs of struggle, no signs of murder, but it can't be murder because they do end up coming back, one month later, just with blood stains on their hands and no memory of anything. We call It the vanishing. It keeps me up at night every time I try and sleep, I wonder where they go, how they get there, why and who's blood is on their hands? Where did their memory go? I couldn't bear the thought of losing Sophie, not after losing Tanya. I was only 8-years-old and my dad had gone to the market to sell the wood he cut earlier that evening and 4 year old Sophie and I were left at home with 15 year old Tanya, my older sister. It happened to be the time our mother came back from the vanishing, the thing was, we weren't expecting it, it hadn't been a month yet, but she still came in our old hut. she came in through our front door and Tanya told us to get in the cupboard and don't come out until she told us to. I knew it might have been a while before I came out, but I never expected what happened next. I remember how I was holding Sophie tightly in my arms within the closet, when I heard a scream, but it was cut short followed by silence for a few seconds before a loud thud. I had peeked out of the closet hoping to see Tanya there telling me it was ok to come out but to my horror Tanya's body was lying motionless on the ground in a puddle of red liquid in the moonlight. I remember how I was peeking out of the closet, my eyes wide and terrified, streaming with tears, one hand clasped on sophies mouth and the other on my own as if I didn't even trust myself to stay quiet. Everything after that was a blur, my mother disappeared and when my <mark>fat</mark>her got home and saw me and Sophie crying hysterically over Tanya, he just looked down sadly. I do remember one thing from that night though, I remember as I was peeking out of the closet's wooden door, I saw the look in my mother's eyes, they were white and almost glazed, and the weird thing is, she didn't have blood on her hands like all the other people who usually come back from the vanishing. And she didn't stay either, usually when you come back from the vanishing you stay here.

I shake myself back to reality and grab my bow, arrow quiver and hunting knife. I planned to go hunting with Matthew today and try and make some sort of profit out of it. I climb in trees and weave between branches and bushes, keeping my eye out for any prey or movement, but mostly for those UpperClass spoiled brats out punishing us LowerClass peasants for fun. WoodsCreek is split into two parts, the UpperClass, aka the rich entitled brats, and the LowerClass, which is me and my family who, unlike those posh vermin, actually have to work and hunt for a living. Ok so maybe hunting in the woods surrounding the classes is classified as poaching and illegal but as long as I'm not caught, I'll keep hunting for as long as it means we don't starve. Suddenly I stop, something doesn't feel right, like I'm being watched. I turn around scanning my surroundings and see something in the bush. I'm about to tell Matthew how funny he is for hiding when I see blonde hair. Matthew doesn't have blonde hair, he has dark brown hair. I jump back, clutch my bow, and grab an arrow from my quiver. I see a tall boy walk out from the bush.

Apart from the occas<mark>io</mark>nal leaves, you didn't need a genius to figure he was from the UpperClass, with his shiny blonde hair combed perfectly to the side, his rings, and his exceptional suit. I realised that my bow had lowered slightly and immediately rose it again.

"Woah, no need to shoot at me, Cupcake. Not a smart idea to start a war," he had a smirk on his face. I wished I could wipe it off his stupid face by shooting him, but I knew he was right. "No one calls me Cupcake, you rich brat," I snapped back, "and I don't shoot people either, you idiot. How long have you been following me?" I lowered my bow, and he looked a bit offended but totally ignored my question. "Hey, that's not nice-" But I cut him off and for some reason I just lost it. "Life isn't nice, not everyone can be as rich or wealthy as you, and why are you here anyway? You don't look like you could even kill a fly. Unlike you, some people actually have to hunt and work to live, we can't just sit and laze around all day or we'd starve, but of course you would have no idea because you have the easy life. Do you know what it's like not having a mother? Of course you don't, because you get spoiled rotten with your parents love, money, I didn't get any of that, and I never will, all I have is Sophie, and every month I have to live in fear of losing her because of the vanishing, and I bet you filthy rich jerks don't even have to deal with half of the things we have been through, poverty, starvation, I'll bet you guys lose no one to the vanishing, you guys probably have absolutely no clue what the vanishing is!"

I stormed off in anger, but the blonde boy followed. I hate when those UpperClass people think that everyone lives in the luxury they have. I started to run and attempt to lose him in the trees, but he, surprisingly, caught up. "Why are you following me?" There was a hint of frustration in his voice, "Because maybe our life isn't all you think, we may be rich, but we still get affected by the vanishing. So far we've lost 17 people."

What he said made me stop, I look back at him. "Why don't you teach them? It'll be nice for them to know who they are again" He held my gaze, "That's not what I mean, they don't even come back, once they go, they're gone for good."

I just stand there in shock and disbelief. That's what happened to my mother, but she did come back, sort of. "That's happened to you too, hasn't it?" I realise that he's looking at me expectantly. "No..." I start but then I catch him looking at me with really-because-I-don't-think-so expression on his face. "Ok. It was my mother, but she still did sort of come back..." I tell him the whole story of Tanya and how my mother looked like she was being controlled, and how she disappeared, and how that night we pretty much lost our father too.

"...and so now I have to hunt for the family to actually make profit of some sort and survive but if you are going to tell on me, I'll always go back on the thing I said about not shooting people and you won't make it back to tell them." He took a step back and put his hands up. "Hey, I won't tell, but don't shoot me please. And am I the only one who thinks that something weird or sinister is going on? Like, why, just suddenly, are people disappearing for good? And why were they disappearing in the first place? And what exactly is the vanishing?" He looked up to see I was staring at him intently. "Or maybe I'm just being stupid." "Oh no, trust me, sometimes I get barely any sleep because my mind can't shake the feeling something is off." He holds out his hand. "We... got off on a bad start. I'm Alex." I grab his hand hesitantly, "Katrina".

# Review of 'AND SOME FOUND GRAVES' by Frank Kilpatrick

This is the title of an astonishing little booklet compiled by A.J. Thompson of Albany in Western Australia and first printed in 1993. The words of the title are from a poem by a goldfields poet Jack Sorensen and refer to the assorted fates which befell early gold fossickers.

The book (and I will refer to it as such, even though it is very small) reinforces my long held assertions that there is so much real-life drama tucked away and largely unknown in our State's short history that would rival or surpass much fiction. I have previously enthused about two remarkable W.A. books; 'Gold on the Murchison' and 'The Entombed Miner' which contain amazing real-life facts and dramas and open great windows into past events. There are many more written adventures which unfortunately are not widely known.

The book put together by A.J. Thompson is one of several which I believe contain wonderful material for films. Sadly though, this particular story does not have a happy ending. The book is almost entirely transcriptions from an uncommonly well-written and sprightly diary kept by an energetic young man named John Aspinall who left his native New Zealand in 1895 to try his luck on the Coolgardie gold fields. He was then aged 22 and had the gift of writing in a most readable and enjoyable manner. I felt that the spirit of the writing was a pleasant mix of youthful eagerness with a dash of maturity and wisdom so lacking in many blathering 22 year old teenagers we see today.

He was travelling with a friend named Walter Rylance who shared his adventures but about whom we are told few details. It is mostly 'We' did this or 'We' did that. I am about to include an extract from the book, where in his diary Aspinall records arrival by train at Southern Cross, which was then as far as the rail line went. I was interested to read that he refers to the place as "The Cross". because when I made train trips through the place in my youth, seasoned travellers then called the place "The Cross" also, so it must have been a time-honoured habit.

"The Cross is a windy, dirty, dusty hole from which anyone is very glad to depart. It is a sort of scattered township of calico and hessian houses with a sprinkling of iron houses --large wide streets, ankle deep in dust, and some of them littered with old empty meat cans, tags, sacks and ropes ends. Every now and again a "willy-willy" comes along and envelopes everything in dust, chaff and sand. All the streets are named after stars in the Southern Hemisphere. I enquired for Lake Polaris which is close to the town and was shown a sort of depression grown over with scattered tufts of grass and stunted scrub. The fact that it is a lake is shown by the salt water which can be got in wells at depths varying from a few feet. The water is thrice saltier than the sea and plays great havoc with the boots and clothes of the men who work in the mines round about. Water (condensed) sells at 3d a gall and has a very insipid taste, resembling boiled water with a dash of galvanised iron and several other unrecognisable substances including smoke."

One of the many interesting features of the book is that Aspinall hailed from a land drenched with water with lakes and rivers abounding. His family had a gold-sluicing business at a flowing river, using high-pressure water to wash gold out of the landscape and yet from day one on the goldfields and through his many adventures he copes with the terrible conditions with what emerges as a calm and competent good humour.

I feel I should digress at this point to discuss water or the lack of it on the goldfields at the time of Aspinall's visit. In the whole vast area there is virtually no standing fresh water, except for pools left after heavy rain. In dry years, which are common, the country is waterless, dangerous and deadly.

There was no government water-supply as we know it today, but the government had established some condensers which burned huge amounts of native trees to fuel them. The water was sold per gallon. There were apparently some private small condensers set up here and there where gold-rushes occurred and water could be bought.

The government had also done work on several large rock outcrops between Southern Cross and Coolgardie, building low stone walls down the sloping expanses of rock to direct rain water into storage pits or tanks at the bottom. These enterprises were effective and extremely important, especially so for the steam locomotives yet to come on the railway now pushing at feverish pace ever eastwards to Coolgardie, Kalgoorlie and beyond. Locomotives demanded huge amounts of the best quality water. Not any old water, as impure water ruined the boilers. Aspinall hardly mentions the railway, but its rapid development across harsh arid land is one of the wonders of that incredible phase of our history.

So, here we have Aspinall at Southern Cross, wanting to reach Coolgardie. From here there is no more rail. There is also no road. There are instead numerous rough, dusty, churned up tracks across the harsh scrubby, and in some places, heavily timbered country. And heavily timbered some of the places were and are. While we have mental pictures of pioneers trekking across barren wastelands, how often do we visualise trying to get horse teams and wagons through parts where there are trees every couple of metres? And some of the trees were large. Not easy. The traffic volume was constant and the achievements hard to believe. In addition to large amounts of foodstuffs, furniture, household goods, and building materials, there were many large and extremely heavy parts of mining machinery. The water problem was everywhere. There were large numbers of horses and other animals, all needing lots of water. How did they do it all? We will now never know the details and it is quite mind-boggling. Even today, for some strange reason, I find the Hampton Plains, east of Southern Cross, a forbidding area. I have done the Kalgoorlie trip many times and even in a modern car on a good road I am uneasy and always pleased to have that section behind me.

Aspinall and his friend get away for Coolgardie "with a teamster". It is not clear whether they rode on the wagon or walked. The speed of travel would be the same in either case. To quote: 
"There are said to be 500 teams on the road and 2000 camels. The first part of the road is very heavy with sand and dust, the horses stir it up so much that one soon becomes of the complexion of a salmon brick. I felt terribly dirty as we did not have enough water to afford a wash."

He then goes on to give wonderfully informative comments on the various 'staging posts', or embryonic settlements along the way, as well as the landscapes. I will supply a quote from his notes on the watering place of Bullabulling, not far from Coolgardie: -

"Bullabulling has a very good dam but lately a man was found drowned in it, so no one drinks the water -- not that people in this country are very particular, but the man was suffering from fever. Fortunately there is a good soak near at hand so we got water there."

They arrive in Coolgardie which Aspinall said did not impress him, even though it was " a thousand times better that The Cross." He finds that here the cost of water is a staggering four shillings per gallon which must have worked out at close to half a day's pay for a labourer. He writes:-

"The streets are very wide and dusty and there are a few substantial buildings of local brick, but the greater part of the shops are of the usual galvanised iron and calico and hessian materials that go to form a goldfields town. I spent yesterday morning washing some of my clothes, which with water at 4/- is rather

an event. The dry process consists of hanging your shirt on a bush for a fortnight and beating it occasionally with a club. This is the country where you can learn the true value of water and how to be economical in its use. People in well watered countries can scarcely believe, I dare say, that it is possible to wash a plate in a teaspoon of water or cold tea and make it clean too!"

Aspinall was obviously not poor and he and his friend bought two camels for 134 pounds, which was a heck of a lot of money. They also hired an Afghan cameleer and after acquiring much stores and prospecting gear set off on an enormous tour of the country, walking un-imaginable distances and experiencing many adventures which our diarist records marvellously. At one stage, in the middle of nowhere, Aspinall and the Afghan quarrel, upon which the Afghan declares he is finished with the deal and storms off into the never-never, possibly not to be seen again. Our unflappable hero, true to form, thought "I am now very familiar with dealing with camels and I can control camels as well as any Afghan." He was right; he could and did. Amazingly, the Afghan made it back to Coolgardie, where the two met up again.

Aspinall and his mate obviously tried a lot of prospecting, although weirdly he hardly ever gives any details of this. Although I champion his writing there is pretty much a blank about their efforts or methods of looking for gold or if they ever found any. There is one vague clue about their digging at a spot south of Coolgardie where he says something to the effect that the gold petered out at a certain depth. Does that mean they got some? They certainly walked a huge number of miles, seeing and recording many events, and Aspinall takes the reader with them. He gives good details of life in Coolgardie which was even complete with two loud-mouthed American street-salesmen shyster types who added to the atmosphere of our version of the wild west. He also visited "Hannans" where the first gold was found by Patrick Hannan and is now known as Kalgoorlie. He does not say much about the town, which then was incredibly small but seems more interested in the dry-blowing methods of prospecting which must have seemed so weird to him, having been used to hosing hill-sides with thousands of gallons of water to find gold. At Hannans, dusty dry soil was shaken and blown about looking for the heavier material left behind, with the heaviest being gold, of course. With luck, the fossicker may find a piece as big as a grain of rice, or if really lucky the size of a pea. Or if phenomenally lucky, even bigger. They seldom found any at all.

"We camped after going 11 miles and reached Hannans at midday next day. It is a small township of 20 or 30 iron houses, several hessian ones and the usual collection of tents. It is situated about 24 miles from Coolgardie and is officially called Kalgoorlie. This was the best alluvial patch in the country and there are still numbers of men dryblowing all over the place, but the average earnings are small. Dryblowing machines are of every description, the principle being as a rule the same as that of a "cradle".

Some called Rockers and Shakers are very crude affairs, being simply a series of square sieves which are rocked from side to side, or being set on flexible legs are shaken backwards and forwards. As a rule no attempt is made to save gold finer than a pins head.

The best machines have, besides the rocking motion a pair of bellows which keeps a blast of air going through the machine."

Aspinall travels on about 20 miles (about 35 kilometres) north-east of Kalgoorlie to what he calls "White Feather", its original name, while acknowledging that it was then officially Kanowna. This becomes very ironic, because he is more impressed with the town than Kalgoorlie and indicates that Kanowna was bigger and better. I have been to the site of Kanowna and there is now absolutely nothing left. No sign that a town ever existed, while Kalgoorlie is very large and important. He mentions a "cement lead" at Kanowna; that being a mining term and the "cement" is not an industrial cement as we know it but a very hard type of ground.

The word "lead" does not mean a soft grey metal but means a leader or alignment of ground indicating it could have gold. He writes a lot about White Feather. Here is a sample: -

"White Feather, officially called Kanowna, has more of a township than Hannans and is really a well laid out little town. There are 4 first class hotels and several nice business places. We got our tent erected near the town and the other New Zealanders camped beside us. (He had recently met some).

There is a cement lead near this place from which a great amount of gold has been taken. It is about 200 yards long and 100 ft wide and about 12000 ozs are said to have been obtained from it.

In Aspinall's writings, probably the most surprising thing to me was the fact that in such inhospitable unforgiving country they always found water. Mind you, the country was obviously not in drought and they experienced a couple of heavy rains. Even so, on one occasion the Afghan left their camp to fetch water and travelled 28 miles (almost 50 kilometres) each way, to secure it.

Unfortunately, even though I have been putting off having to deal with the subject, I do have to at some time deal with the demise of this remarkable young man. For some time now the mates had been without camels or Afghan and used horses. They were camped a long, long way north of Coolgardie; in fact 15 kilometres west of Laverton of all places. This is the last entry in that wonderful diary:-

"Friday March 13th 1896. For the past few nights we have had some heavy thunderstorms which will freshen up the grass nicely. I have been trying all around but so far without success. At a reef about 3 mile from here they got good gold (by dollying) in a kind of silicerous iron -- the gold is invisible to the naked eye. The country formation at Hawks Nest is entirely different to any other field I have been on."

In February 1980 Mr. A.J. Thompson of Albany was prospecting for gold about 15 kilometres west of Laverton and in the bush found an old indistinct grave-mound marked only with a termite-riddled post. Nearby was a piece of tin on which was some old faded painted writing. The writing described who was buried. This is a really amazing part of the story because most of the script was still legible!

The lettering on the tin when found, read thus:-

Sacred to the memory of

JOHN ASPINALL
Late of ......Point, Otago NZ

Killed by .....ning March 18th 1896 Aged 23 years

Gone but not forgotten

Mr. Thompson tidied up the grave and tended it for 5 years on his trips to the area until by investigating in New Zealand he found out much information and even had access to the diary. There is some unresolved doubt as to the actual day in March on which the death occurred. The culmination of his efforts is the great little book. One of the bits of information which came Mr. Thompson's way was an item in a goldfields newspaper, 'The Golden Age' of April 4 1896.

I will close by quoting it:-

"THE DEATH OF JOHN ASPINALL. --- It will be remembered that on the 14th of March the body of a man named John Aspinall who left a camp at Hawks Nest, was found about 100 yards from his own camp lying on his face with the clothes ripped off one side and one boot off. Constable Bradley of Menzies went out on the 22nd to make enquiries, and now reports that Aspinall was killed by lightning."



James Wilson.





### **ARTICLE AUGUST 2024**

One of the many great things about my job is that I get to travel throughout the beautiful Wheatbelt, Great Southern and Southwest region of WA. Some days I spend 6 hours driving to see someone who has reached out. No complaints the scenery is always great and always changing. We are lucky to live where we do.

There is another great and heart warming happening that I also get to see firsthand in our great communities. That is how in every town the majority of community support and look out for each other. In the last few weeks, I have sat with those I'm working with listening to that person describe how their town has wrapped around them adding extra support without any prompting or second thought. Some examples of this are dropping off cooked meals, regularly visiting or phoning, gardening and maintaining lawns, listening and really caring. Where the person doesn't feel they need that help being offered they are still left with a feeling of thankfulness and belonging. Both individuals and groups appear to have no hesitation to help they just do. One person said to me 'at the end of day we are neighbours, so we have to look out for each other'. In one town the people being helped had recently moved there and their statement was " If I had any doubts about why I moved here it has definitely gone, this town and the people are just amazing'.

I have often been phoned, approached

in person, with someone asking me to get in contact with a person they are concerned about. More proof the person of concerns community cares. Counselling has boundaries that include not what is called 'cold calling' someone when asked. Another agency, your GP can give me referral to call but this also has to be with the permission of the person being called themselves. The initial call will be 'I have been asked by ... to call you'. The only time cold calling is acceptable is when I'm doing post disaster recovery and will call in to do what is known as a 'welfare check'. These welfare checks are with the recovery's lead agency's knowledge and are not counselling, sometimes they may become counselling.

When someone is struggling mentally or otherwise an offer of help even if not needed is appreciated by the majority. A person may due to their high emotions appear to be annoyed you have offered help. But this person mostly has also appreciated your thought and the care. I know this because when I work with these people they say, 'Its nice to know people actually care all the same'.

The sense of belonging and being valued from being supported by those who care cannot be underestimated. Being valued results in being given hope, hope is very powerful. When I meet with those who have been supported the positivity and hope the person has of getting through their



struggle is realised as achievable. The idea of a holistic approach in counselling is that the whole person is assisted. The ability to recover and get through is harder if the person is also struggling to get the practical things done such as cooking, is struggling financially, feels isolated and alone. Never underestimate how dropping off a meal, taking time to call in or phone, offer help with chores positively adds to this person's road to recovery. Even though its 'just what we do in the bush'.

Some even when they know people are trying to help still struggle. If you are struggling or know someone who is not themselves reach out. Be strong and ask for help, be strong and be that help. Call me at Rural Aid I'm here to help. Call one of the other agencies you know. Tell your GP. Tell a friend. Ask 'are you OK'. Also, a reminder that when talking to me your confidentiality is guaranteed and respected. Your trust in me is valued and respected. You do matter.

### SOFT CARAMEL FUDGE AND APPLE SLICE

### **Soft Caramel Fudge**

### **Ingredients**

- 125g butter
- 395g NESTLE Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 1 tbsp golden syrup
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 3/4 cup CADBURY Baking White Chocolate Block chopped into pieces small.

#### Method

### Step 1

Line a 7cm x 25cm bar tin with baking paper.

### Step 2

Melt butter in a medium saucepan over a low heat. Add condensed milk, golden syrup and brown sugar.

### Step 3

Stir over a low heat until it comes to the boil, then simmer for 10 minutes, stirring constantly.

### Step 4

Remove from heat, stir in white chocolate and mix until smooth.

### Step 5

Pour into prepared tin and allow to cool. Refridgerate for at least two hours. Serve cut into squares or slices.

#### Notes

Cooling time is very important as it needs this to set properly. If you do not allow enough time to cool, your fudge may have more of a toffee consistency.

### **Apple Slice**

### **Ingredients**

- 125g soft butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 1/4 cups plain flour
- 1 1/2 tsp baking powder
- 3 apples, cored, peeled, sliced

### **Topping**

- 1/4 cup brown sugar

- 1 tsp ground cinnamon

#### Method

### Step 1

Place butter, sugar, eggs, vanilla essence, milk, flour and baking powder in a mixing bowl.

### Step 2

Beat on low speed to combine. Increase speed to medium and beat for 3 minutes.

### Step 3

Pour into a greased 20cm x 30cm tin.

### Step 4

Press apple slices on top of mixture.

### Step 5

Sprinkle the combined topping ingredients over apples.

### Step 6

Bake at 180C for 25-30 minutes.

### Wednesday To Friday

#### **Around Kulin**

The camp site opens on Wednesday prior to the races, with many visitors arriving early to gain a desirable camping spot. While the Bush Races volunteers are busy preparing for race day, visitors are able to take a walk in the bush and explore the local tourist attractions including Jilakin Rock and Jilakin Lake. Many make a day trip to Kulin and/or surrounding towns, which enables visitors to appreciate the unique qualities of the agricultural areas

If you are in Kulin from Wednesday to Friday morning, visit some of the local attractions: Butler's Garage and Museum, Kulin Gallery Girls, Kulin Community Arts Council and the Kulin Community Hall, which encompasses a display by the Kulin Quilters. Visitors are encouraged to check out local shopping and support local businesses.

#### The Friday

### **Evening Fun**

Friday evening has become popular with our guests, with bands, entertainment, home prepared cuisine and great bar facilities, open from 3pm – 11pm.

For the young ones, an underage disco is closely supervised to provide a safe and fun environment to rock the evening away.

An important interruption to the evening is the famous 'Mini Tin Horse Race' with all proceeds being donated to the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

#### The Saturday

### Morning Wakeup Call

As the sun rises over Jilakin Lake, the 'Last Post', echoes around the packed campground. A group of Vietnam Veterans conduct a moving service at Camp Hart located east of the main camping ground. The commemorative service is a reminder of the human sacrifice made to afford

us the freedom we are blessed with today.

The memorial service is followed by complimentary tea and toast, supplied by Kulin Bush Races.

### The Saturday Events Begin

The weekend horse events commence with an equine event either a display, gymkhana and/or barrel racing. Each year, the program is revisited, and a decision made to compliment the weekends' program.

During the morning, entertainment commences with food venues open and coffee available, creating a carnival atmosphere. The excitement ramps up with activities for the children, which usually includes: climbing wall, laser tag, McDonald's farm animals, Kids Tent activities, bouncy castles, and many other adventurous events for children of all ages.

The crowd continues to swell as people stream in from the camping area to witness the opening parade, usually a combination of farm machinery, both new and old.

The scene is set for an afternoon of horse racing, with patrons lining up to place a bet, bidding to buy a horse in the ever -popular Calcutta. The crowd lines the fence to witness the excitement generated by eight massive horses pounding their way to the finish line.

Other guests are content to sit back in the comfort of the Marquee Bar quietly sipping a bubbly or a beer, enjoying the cuisine and having a casual chat. Kulin Bush Races offers a casual and friendly atmosphere for everyone.

Between horse races, the non stop events include: sheep races, tug of war, hobby horse races and other fun events. Following the final horse race, a very entertaining dog race is run, usually with greyhounds and local pet dogs of various breeds. With an encore, the first of the fireworks explodes into life. Twenty minutes of intense light and sound, keeps the audience in stunned silence, followed by an eruption of applause to match the fireworks grand finale.

With hardly a pause, the second band fires up to entertain the crowd, everyone dancing to the music that echoes around the racetrack. Then the third band takes over to provide the final entertainment of the evening. The Bush Races atmosphere is highly charged with everyone having a great time as they dance the night away.

The call is made for "last drinks" as the bar closes. In less than six hours, Kulin Bush Races will host the Great Aussie Revival breakfast. The stragglers slowly drift to the camping ground, while volunteers work on a quick clean-up ready for the morning.

### **History Of National Baker Day**

The last name Baker is of Old English origin and was formed from the words 'bakere' and 'baecere' in Middle English. Furthermore, it comes from the term 'bacan', which means 'to dry by heat' or 'to bake'. It originated before the eighth century and was primarily used as an occupational name for people who baked bread or bricks.

During the Middle Ages, most households baked their bread, so the popular belief is that the name was used to refer to the owner of a communal oven, who was in charge of baking bread for a community or village. This position is considered to have been a hereditary feudal privilege. Alternatively, the name might have been given to those noted for baking particularly fine bread or to bakers of pottery and bricks.

Baker is also a first name in the US though the popularity level is low. Before 2018, it didn't make the list of the 1,000 most popular male names. In 2018, it finally made the list, ranking 712. This rank rose to 449 in 2021, with 678 births matching the name in that year.






