## Media Release – Kulin Medical Services

Kulin Shire Council held a Special Council Meeting on Friday 11<sup>th</sup> July 2025 to consider the delivery of GP (doctor services) to Shire of Kulin residents.



Traditionally, the Shire of Kulin and Shire of Kondinin have had an arrangement for shared doctor services being three days per week of GP services to the Shire of Kondinin (60%) and two days per week to the Shire of Kulin (40%). Unfortunately, the Shire of Kulin has been unable to reach an agreement to continue the two-day-per-week medical service in Kulin under the existing arrangement with the Shire of Kondinin.

At the Special Council Meeting, Council resolved to formally withdraw from the historic shared services arrangement with the Shire of Kondinin and to engage St Luke's Family Practice to provide ongoing GP services in Kulin.

Through recent community consultation as part of the Strategic Integrated Planning framework, Health Services were identified as the second-highest strategic priority for the region. This included a strong focus on retaining a General Practice service in Kulin for two (2) days per week, as well as continued advocacy for access to primary health and ancillary services locally.

Council recognises how important consistent and reliable GP services are to our community and has worked diligently to establish a new partnership with St Luke's Family Practice to meet this need.

St Luke's Family Practice, based in Katanning, is a well-established practice with a dedicated team of doctors committed to provide high quality services to the community. St Luke's Family Practice has clinics in in Katanning and Wagin and provides outreach services in Tambellup, Frankland, Williams, Darkan and Dumbleyung.

Kulin Shire Council recognises that change can be challenging and remains committed to working closely with St Luke's Family Practice to ensure the delivery of a consistent, high-quality GP service.

We are also committed to maintaining access to reliable primary health services across the Shire. Importantly, the Kulin Nursing Clinic and Child Health services will not be affected by this new doctor arrangement and will continue to operate as usual.

Council will keep the community fully informed throughout the transition to St Luke's Family Practice and will work closely with residents to support a smooth and effective changeover.

## Community Reminder: Responsible Dog Ownership in the Shire of Kulin

The Shire of Kulin wishes to remind all dog owners of their important responsibilities under the Dog Act 1976 (WA).

The Shire continues to receive complaints regarding dogs wandering at large in and around the Kulin townsite — often without a collar or registration tag, and in some cases, unregistered entirely. This not only breaches local laws, but creates distress and safety risks for community members, particularly those walking their own dogs on leads or supervising children.

Unattended dogs roaming freely can:

- Cause conflict with other animals or people.
- Create anxiety or fear among other dog owners and walkers.
- Pose a traffic hazard or

be injured themselves.

- Undermine community safety and amenity.

To help ensure a safe and harmonious community for everyone, all dog owners are reminded that:

- Dogs must be confined to your property at all times unless under effective control.
- Dogs must not be allowed to roam unattended.
- All dogs over the age of three months must be registered with the Shire of Kulin.
- All dogs must be microchipped, with current details provided to the Shire.
- Dogs must wear a collar with a valid registration tag when in public places.

The Shire actively investigates reports of

wandering or unregistered dogs, and enforcement action may be taken where appropriate.

We thank our community for their cooperation in promoting responsible pet ownership and helping to maintain a safe and respectful environment for all residents — two-legged and four-legged alike.

## Local Government Elections 2025

**The next local government ordinary election will be held  
on Saturday 18 October 2025**

This year the Shire of Kulin will have three vacancies and will elect Councillors for a term of four years.

### Who can vote?

---

#### **Residents**

All residents in a local government district who are enrolled on the State electoral roll are automatically enrolled on the corresponding local government roll.

You must make sure you are correctly enrolled, and your details are up to date by 5pm 22 August to vote in the Local government elections.

To check your enrolment status on the residents roll visit the Western Australian Electoral Commission at <https://www.elections.wa.gov.au/oec#/oec>

#### **Owners and Occupiers**

People who own or occupy rateable property within a local government district, can apply to their local government to be included on the roll as an owner/occupier, as long as they are eligible electors.

So, if you own a property in Kulin but do not live here or you operate a business in Kulin, you may be eligible to be added to the Shire's owner/occupier roll. To be eligible you must be:

- Registered on the state electoral roll where you live, and
- Either own or have a right of continuous occupation under a lease agreement or other legal instrument of a property within the Shire of Kulin; and
- The right of continuous occupation must extend for a period of at least three months.

Enrolment on the owner/occupier roll allows a person who is enrolled to vote at one address, and owns or occupies property at a different address, to vote in both areas.

To be able to vote at the 2025 Local Government elections in the Shire of Kulin you must complete an *Enrolment Eligibility Claim* form and return to the Shire Office by Friday 25 July 2025. Please email Nicole [eso@kulin.wa.gov.au](mailto:eso@kulin.wa.gov.au) to request a claim form.

## Kulin Childcare Centre



We have been celebrating NAIDOC week at Kulin Child Care Centre, this year's theme 'The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy'.

Our celebration will extend over 2 weeks as we have many things to explore and discuss.

Our children have made upcycled music shakers with cardboard tubes

and native seed pods. They were decorated with symbols which we discussed. We used these in our Indigenous themed dancing. Children followed this with posting schema – non-linear.



A local book called Karda wer Norn is a great bilingual story about Goanna and Snake told by Charmaine & Phyllis Bennell. We read this story often as we practice and become familiar with the words within, this supports story sharing.

We explored the colours of Torres Strait islander and Aboriginal Flag through art taking inspiration –Deconstruct/reconstruct.



Our walking action song 'I went walking in the bush one day' allowed us to practise Noongar language and listening skills as we worked through our native animals – Land links.

#### **Second-hand shouldn't mean second best**

Buying second-hand can not only be more cost effective than buying new, it can also be more sustainable and better for the environment. But is it safe?

When you buy second-hand products online from a business or in a shop, like a thrift store, you can expect the same consumer guarantee rights as when you are buying a brand new product.

This means you have the legal right to expect the product is of acceptable quality, including that it is safe, durable and free from defects, matches the description and is fit for purpose.

If the item doesn't meet these consumer guarantees, then you are entitled to a remedy, which could be a repair, refund or replacement.

If you are buying from a private seller who is not running a business, these consumer guarantees don't generally apply. Think of it like 'buyer beware'.

When shopping second-hand online, it's not always obvious if you're dealing with a private seller or a business. One of the simplest ways to find out is to ask the seller directly if they are operating as a business. You can also look for clues in the details they provide. For example, a business will often use a registered business name rather than a personal name and they may list their Australian Business Number (ABN).

Frequent listings or customer reviews may also suggest they are regularly selling second-hand products, although this alone might not confirm their business status. Businesses are also more likely to include professional contact details.

When you buy a second-hand item online, it's good practice to keep the seller's contact information, listing information and descriptions, and proof of purchase. This may help you get a resolution down the track if product safety or other issues arise.

Do your research before you commit to buying a second-hand item. Check if the product has been recalled or banned, or is non-compliant with mandatory standards via [productsafety.gov.au](https://www.productsafety.gov.au). Find out the age of the product and how long similar products normally last as this may provide an indication of when issues may arise and how much longer you can expect the product to last. Have a close look at the photos for wear and tear or damage. Finally, check if the product comes with the original packaging or instructions. These often contain important safety information for assembling, using and maintaining the product. If they aren't provided, look for them online.

If you receive your 'new' second-hand product and find it is unsafe, damaged, or doesn't meet your expectations, contact the business to resolve the issue. Check if the online marketplace you used has a buyer protection policy or dispute resolution service if the business won't resolve the issue.

You may still be able to access a remedy from the manufacturer if you discover the item is subject to a recall later on. The official recall notice will provide these details.

If you're planning on having a clear out at home and selling some unwanted items online, then there are some things you can do to be a good social citizen. Make sure any claims you make about the safety of the product are accurate and check it hasn't been recalled or banned since you bought it.

It's also worth checking the item meets current minimum safety standards. That baby cot might have been great in 1987 but is it still considered safe by today's standards?

Try and keep a record of who you sold an item to in case there is a safety recall in the future. As the primary purchaser, you may be the one notified of the recall, so you'll need to act quickly to let the new owner know.

## GET YOUR HANDS IN THE GARDEN...

Right now, though, the soil is soft, damp, and absolutely perfect for getting those veggie seeds tucked in. My gardening to-do list has suddenly exploded—but what a joyful task list it is!

**Let's Talk Roses** It's rose pruning season, and yes, you can be a bit bold with it. Look for spindly stems and snip them back to the thickness of a little finger. Cut away dead branches right down to the stump, and aim to open up the centre of each bush so it can breathe. Don't forget to treat those soft pink or olive-toned water shoots gently—they're your future blooms. Encourage them with a light prune and watch the magic happen.

Roses are tougher than they look. Don't be afraid to give them a serious haircut. Clearing out old, wrinkled or bumpy branches can do wonders for flower production. I usually cut mine back by a third, even half—and they always thank me in spring.

**What to Plant This July** I've gathered a list of veggie seeds that are just right for July sowing, and it's bursting with variety. Got a favourite? I'm eyeing off a few myself and already plotting more garden beds to keep up with my ambitions. There's something about flipping through fresh garden magazines—stuffed with dreamy landscapes and clever layouts—that sparks all kinds of planting plans. Our post mistress may chuckle at my enthusiasm, but I wear my garden geek badge proudly!

If only the days were longer, I'd be out there from dawn till dusk with soil under my nails and a wheelbarrow full of possibility.

## *Frogs' Eggs and Birthday Wishes*

This weekend, my baby girl turns 19. I can't begin to explain how odd that feels. There were many times — as I'm sure every parent can attest — when the days dragged by, and others when they simply flew. Now I look at the strong, caring, independent person she's become, and I'm unimaginably proud of her.

With that in mind, I'm making a birthday treat.

Now, my girl doesn't like cake... I know, it's odd. But there's a funny family story behind that involving a dare and a whole 500g block of butter. I'll save that for another time though, as I'm not sure she'd forgive me for telling it.

That birthday was the last time I got to make an actual birthday cake for her. These days, she asks for different desserts instead — from tiramisu to Eton mess, lemon impossible pie to chocolate pudding. But her all-time favourite is sago.

I don't know if anyone else grew up with this treat, but it was a regular in our house. One of my Granny's special desserts, served with a great big scoop of ice cream. We'd tuck into our bowls and make faces when Grandad told us it was frogs' eggs.

Sago is one of those recipes that doesn't appear often anymore, but it's not hard to make — and it's so, so yummy.

### *Sago Pudding*

**Serves 6**

#### **Ingredients:**

- ½ cup tapioca pearls (sago)
- 1½ cups full-cream milk
- 1½ cups water
- Juice of 3 large lemons
- 1/3 cup golden syrup
- 2 egg yolks
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/3 cup sugar
- Pinch of salt
- Rind of 1 lemon
- 300ml thickened cream

#### **Method:**

1. Combine sago, milk and water in a large saucepan over medium heat. Allow it to gently warm — you don't want the

milk to boil or burn, so keep an eye on it. No need to stir yet. While it's warming, use a potato peeler to peel the lemon rind, avoiding the white pith.

2. Once warmed, add the lemon rind and begin stirring regularly. Continue stirring until the mixture thickens and the sago pearls turn clear. This can take anywhere from 15 to 30 minutes, depending on the brand and age of the sago. If it starts to stick, reduce the heat.
3. Remove from heat and whisk in the lemon juice and egg yolks immediately. Whisk quickly to avoid lumps of cooked egg yolk.
4. Add golden syrup, vanilla, salt and cream. Stir well and set aside to cool until just warm. The flavours will continue to

infuse, and the pudding will begin to set

5. Serve with a generous scoop of vanilla ice cream and enjoy this old-fashioned treat.

## THE STAMPEDE & THE BUSH RACES

### Two Towns, One Wild West Spirit

As we gear up for our 30th Kulin Bush Races this October—undoubtedly set to be another fabulous success and a wonderful outdoor spectacular—I found myself wondering what to write about for this Around the World article. While browsing global events, I stumbled across something that felt surprisingly familiar: the Calgary Stampede.

For those who don't know, Calgary is a major city in Alberta, Canada. It's spectacular—home to over 1.4 million people and the third-largest city in Canada—yet it holds tight to its pioneer charm and old west roots. Nestled in the foothills of the Canadian Rockies, Calgary celebrates its regional history and stunning natural surroundings with pride. But what it's truly famous for is the Calgary Stampede, heralded as “The Greatest Outdoor Show on Earth.”

This annual extravaganza is a 10-day rodeo, exhibition, and festival held every July. And like our Bush Races, it's largely run by volunteers—over 3,000 of them! These passionate locals embody western values, host events across the city, and raise funds for nonprofits and charities. They support youth through programs in performing arts, horsemanship, and animal handling. The Stampede also brings enormous economic benefits, with

Stampede Park hosting more than 1,200 events each year and welcoming over four million visitors. It generates an astonishing \$540 million annually, creating jobs, supporting agriculture and agri-food,

and promoting education around sustainability, land care, and animal welfare.

The more I read, the more I saw echoes of what we do here in Kulin—just on a much larger scale.





I was lucky enough to attend the Stampede back in 2002, and the memories still make me smile. It was phenomenal then, and from what I've seen in my research, it's only grown since! The event began in 1912, evolving from agricultural exhibitions and cowboy sporting events into a full-blown celebration of rural heritage and ranching.

Today, it features chuckwagon races, parades, art exhibits, and stage shows. One of the most meaningful parts is the Elbow River Camp, where visitors can immerse themselves in the cultures of the Kainai, Piikani, Siksika, Tsuut'ina, and Stoney Nakoda First Nations of Treaty 7. You can meet Indigenous artisans and try traditional treats like bannock and Saskatoon berry jam. The Calgary Stampede PowWow showcases the diversity of First Nations dancing, singing, and drumming in an unforgettable celebration of culture.

Beyond that, there are art shows, live music, and more food experiences than you can count. But at its heart, the Stampede



is still about agriculture and the Wild West.

There are breed exhibits for horses, cattle, sheep, and pigs, working dog competitions, and showcases of Alberta's agriculture and agri-food industries. It's a place where global agricultural communities come together to share ideas, foster friendships, and build understanding.

And then there's the rodeo—the biggest outdoor rodeo in the world. Over 10 days and seven events, competitors vie for more than \$2.17 million in prize money. It's a top-tier competition that cowboys and cowgirls across the globe dream of. The thrills, spills, courage, and sportsmanship make for edge-of-your-seat entertainment.

It's a world away from Kulin

in size and scale, but in spirit, it's like magnifying what we do here every year with our Bush Races.

We invite people to our spot on the map and show them that country people are special. We know how to have a good time, we come together to put on fabulous entertainment, raise money and awareness for our community, and showcase the amazing place we get to call home.

So while part of me is



now considering a savings plan to get my cowgirl on and return to the Calgary Stampede, I'm even more excited to get involved right here—volunteer as much time as I can—and soak up every moment of our very own Kulin Bush Races, just around the corner.

# HANDY HINTS FROM YESTERYEAR

Each fortnight, as I prepare the Handy Hints section of the Kulin Update, I find myself wondering what gem to share next. These days, with the internet perched in our pockets and kitchens, answers come faster than a kettle on the boil.

But not so long ago, the humble hint column was a domestic lifeline—a place where young homemakers turned for tried-and-true solutions passed down like family recipes.

Even the treasured CWA cookbook devoted a whole section to household advice. I've often leafed through my Gran's copy, not just for inspiration, but for a good chuckle or a clever trick.

This week, I went on a little journey around the internet to rediscover tips from times past—many still just as handy today as they were back then.

Take a look at what I found. And if your family has a favourite hint passed from generation to generation, why not share it with the rest of us?



### *In the Kitchen*

- No more sunken nuts – Shake nuts in a paper bag with a pinch of flour before adding to batter.
- Speedy spuds – Soak potatoes in salted water for 20 minutes before baking.
- Butter & sugar bliss – Warm your mixing bowl, add butter, then sieve sugar over. Beat until fluffy.
- Juicier lemons – Heat them gently before squeezing for nearly double the juice.
- Parsley that pops – Wash in hot water to make chopping easier and preserve flavour.
- Fluffy rice – A teaspoon of lemon juice in the rice water helps whiten and fluff the grains.
- Bright boiled potatoes – Add lemon juice or vinegar to keep spuds nice and white.

- Revive soggy lettuce – Soak in cold water with lemon juice and refrigerate for an hour.
- Flat-out bacon – Soak in cold water or prick before frying to prevent curling.
- Odour-free veggies – A slice of bread on top of cauliflower or cabbage while cooking reduces smell.

## *Around the House*

- Ant deterrent – A touch of green sage in the cupboard works wonders.
- Sticky cork solution – Glycerin or Vaseline on glue or polish bottle corks stops sticking.
- No-drip creamers – A dab of butter or oil on the lip of the pitcher prevents messy drips.
- Smooth drawers – Rub laundry soap or paraffin on runners for glide-worthy drawers.
- Broom longevity – Soak new brooms in strong salt water before first use.
- Fresh fridge fix – A small container of charcoal absorbs unwanted odours.
- Paint smell solution – A bucket of cold water in the room helps—change every few hours.
- Easy jar lids – Run mason jar lids under hot water to loosen with ease.
- Tidy paintwork – Wet newspaper on window glass before painting for a crisp edge.

## *Garden & Greenery*

- Fern hydration hack – Place one end of a cloth in a water bowl and the other in the pot.
- Bug-free pot plants – A spoonful of mustard in a gallon of water helps kill soil insects.

## *Fixes & First Aid*

- Stuck glasses – Cold water in the top glass, warm water around the bottom. Voilà!
- Splinter solution – Place your hand over a steam-filled bottle opening to draw it out.
- Glass cleanup – Use a damp cloth to collect shards, then toss the cloth away safely.
- Brush revival – Soak hardened brushes in hot vinegar, then wash in warm soapy water.
- Patchy linoleum – Fill holes with chopped cork and glue. Once dry, sand and paint to match.

### **It's not just stolen data, it's stealing YOU**

Scammers love to steal your money, but do you know what they also love to nick? Your identity.

Your identity can be used to open bank accounts, get a credit card, apply for a passport, access your superannuation, apply for government benefits, register a car and even to conduct illegal activities where someone needs to disguise their real identity, such as drug trafficking and money laundering. Having your identity stolen can cause a devastating and long-lasting impact.

Data hacks are sadly becoming a regular occurrence, with the most recent large scale cyber-attack hitting Qantas. Stolen personal information included name, phone number, email and date of birth.

Even with a small amount of personal information, a scammer can steal your identity. They can put the pieces of the puzzle together using public sources such as social media or you may unwittingly hand over further identification through a phishing attack. This could be a fake email, phone call or SMS pretending to be a real business or government service asking for copies of your driver's licence and passport to verify your identity, when their actual aim is to steal it.

If you are a victim of the Qantas hack, or any data breach there are steps you can take to safeguard yourself from identity theft.

Chalk up a few quick wins by turning on multifactor authentication for everything from banking to your social media, log out of all your accounts on all your devices and then update your passwords.

Western Australians can put a block on their driver's licence to help prevent identity theft. When you block your licence through the Department of Transport, it means scammers can't use it for online identity verification through the Australian Government's Document Verification Service (DVS). This is a service used by sectors such as banks, real estate, and telecommunications.

You can add and remove a driver's licence block anytime using [DoTDirect](#) by navigating to the 'Protect your identity' section on the 'Driver's licence' page. Your authority to drive is not affected by having a block on your driver's licence.

The hackers might not use the information they have on you straight away. It could get sold on the dark web at any time so it's important to stay on high alert for unusual emails, calls or texts and keep an eye out for any suspicious transactions.

Get a copy of your credit report to see which organisations have checked your credit history. If a scammer is using your identity to apply for products such as credit cards or loans you will see these in the report. You're entitled to a free copy every three months and you can usually access it online within a day or two of applying. Go to [moneysmart.gov.au](https://moneysmart.gov.au) to apply to one of the three credit reporting agencies for your free report.

If you think you have handed over your personal identification to scammers or believe your identity has been stolen contact WA ScamNet on 1300 30 40 54 or lodge a report to [scamnet.wa.gov.au](https://scamnet.wa.gov.au). The team will help you with the next steps you need to take.
