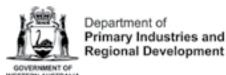
The Kulin Nursing Station continues to operate as normal on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings.

Notice Special Council Meeting

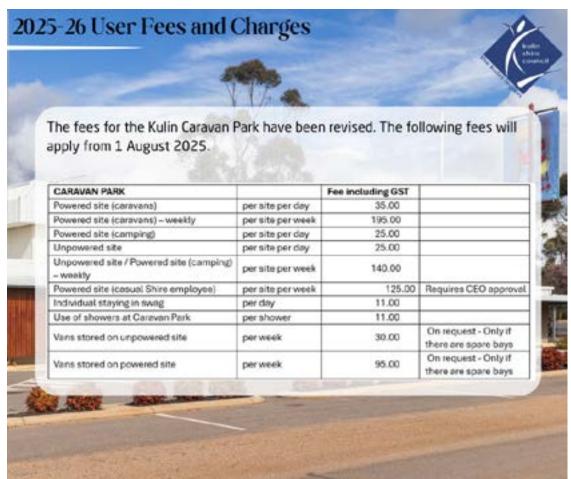

A Note to Farmers – Registering Your Working - Farm Dog/s

The Shire of Kulin would like to kindly remind all farmers and rural property owners that all dogs over three months of age must be registered microchipped, and accordance with the Dog Act 1976 (WA) regardless of whether the dog is a working dog, companion, or located on a rural property.

We understand that farm dogs play an important role in daily operations and are often deeply valued members of the household. However, the Shire regularly receives reports of missing or roaming farm dogs, especially following thunderstorms or gate failures. In many of these instances, the dog is unregistered, unchipped, and without a collar, making it very difficult for the Shire or local residents to reunite the dog with its owner quickly.

Registering and microchipping your dog offers key benefits:

- Ensures your dog can be identified and returned swiftly if it strays or is lost.
- Provides legal proof of ownership.
- Helps the Shire support responsible pet management in our rural and town communities.
- Meets your legal obligations as a dog owner.

We encourage all farmers to take a few simple steps to protect their dogs and assist the broader community by:

- Registering all dogs with the Shire of Kulin.
- Ensuring microchip details are up to date.
- Having your dog wear a collar with a visible registration tag.

We appreciate your support in keeping our rural community safe and connected — and in helping lost dogs find their way home.

Be aware of the signs of a stressed ceiling

When was the last time you really looked at your ceiling? Cracks or sagging might seem minor, but these are common signs of ceiling stress that shouldn't be ignored.

Building and Energy is reminding homeowners to act promptly on warning signs of ceiling stress to prevent a potentially dangerous and costly collapse.

A collapsed ceiling can cause serious injury to anyone underneath and extensive damage to a room's contents and structure. Causes of ceiling failure include poor installation, storm damage, water leaks, inappropriate materials or loads, or incorrect access to the roof space.

Knowing how to spot the telltale signs of a stressed or failing ceiling and acting early is key avoiding the risks, costs and inconvenience associated with a ceiling collapse. Reinforcement and repairs will almost always be a more straightforward option compared to a full ceiling replacement.

So, what should you look out for? Common warning signs of ceiling failure include loud cracking sounds, sagging or dropping of plasterboard sheeting and/or the cornice, visual cracking and small circular marks or blisters appearing in a line on the ceiling. These marks indicate that the plasterboard sheeting may be pulling away from the beam above it.

If you spot any of these signs, don't wait – arrange inspection and repair of the affected areas as soon as possible. Homeowners should contact the builder in the first instance. A properly maintained ceiling should last the life of the building. If you're unsure who built your home, your local government may have this information.

Tenants should promptly report concerns to their landlord or property manager.

Good ceiling care can help prevent future damage. Building and Energy recommends homeowners avoid accessing the ceiling space or storing items there – this is potentially hazardous and heavy loads can damage the ceiling framing or sheeting. Roof leaks should be repaired and any moisture-damaged insulation or plasterboard should be replaced. It's also important to check that exhaust fans and air conditioning outlets are discharging to the outside, not into the ceiling space.

Due to potential electrical hazards, anyone who needs to access a ceiling space, including tradespeople, should turn off the mains power before going up.

A collapsed ceiling can cause serious injury and significant damage. Regularly checking your ceiling and acting on warning signs can help keep your home safe.

TRAFFIC

A number of Electric Ridable Devices are getting about town, so some timely information.

What is an Electric Rideable Device (ERD)?

Regulation 3A of the *Road Traffic Code 2000* (RTC)* defines an ERD as a scooter, skateboard, or other vehicle that;

- Is powered by one or more electric motors
- Has at least 1 wheel
- Is designed to be used by a single person
- Is not capable of going faster than 25 km/h on level ground
- Has dimensions no bigger than 1250 mm in length, 700 mm in width, 1350 mm in height and weighs no more than 25 kg

If a device exceeds any of the above restrictions, it is an unlicensed motor vehicle and not an ERD.

What isn't an ERD?

An ERD does not include motorised scooters, motorised wheelchairs, electric personal transporters, a vehicle with pedals or wheeled toys. Regulation for these devices is contained within the RTC.

The minimum age to ride an ERD is 16 years of age, with the motor/s engaged. (r.228(2) RTC)

Do ERD riders have to wear helmets?

<u>Yes, riders of an ERD have to wear</u> an approved bicycle or motorcycle helmet. (r.223B(2) RTC)

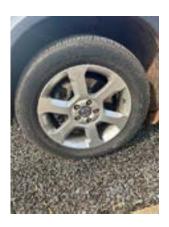
Can ERD's carry a passenger or animal?

No, ERD's are limited to carrying one person only. (r.212(5) RTC)

The new rural blocks in Rankin Street have been one spot and a premises in Day Street recently had four vehicle wheels stolen from the back yard - identical to these pictured here.

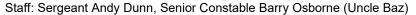

Opportunistic crime is the easiest and hence, the most common type of crime we see in country areas.

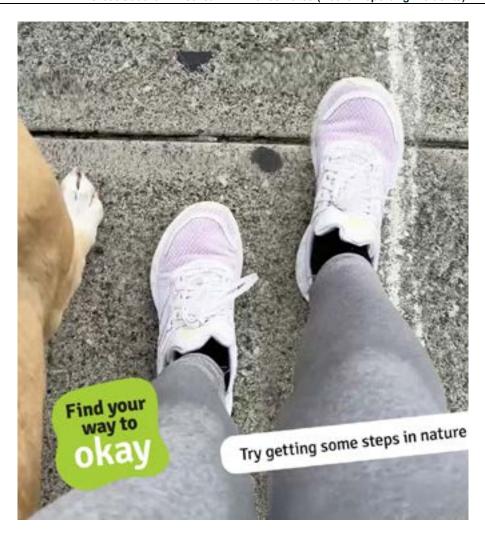

Our celebration of NAIDOC week has continued. We have been incorporating natural materials into our activities. This provides a rich sensory experience and also allows children to compare our usual mediums with natural mediums. Engaging in land-based learning experiences = Land Links.

New resources have arrived to support our indoor and outdoor areas. The new resources were chosen collaboratively, with input from all staff, ensuring a wide range of options to suit our children's needs and interests. The children are thoroughly enjoying the new equipment, with many of the pieces support pushing/pulling, climbing, rocking, vestibular exercise. These cater to a wide range of preferences and it's great our children are able to choose what they might like to explore or strengthen through play each day.







Our new magnifying glasses lead us on a mission to find bugs in our yard recently. This then turned into a veggie patch adventure where a broccoli and few potatoes were collected. Our children practiced their chopping skills with great care slicing up potatoes and broccoli chips for an afternoon tea snack. Using big tools under close supervision builds trust and allows children to practise these important skills. Conversations are held and rules shared before tasks such as below are completed. Activities such as these support children in the cycle of becoming from the Early Years Learning Framework.

RURAL AID JULY ARTICLE

In my travels through our beautiful region, I'm privileged to talk to people from all walks of life and I always ask, "how are you going"?

Often people tell me they are concerned about another because they've noticed that the person 'just doesn't seem to be themselves'. My advice is to ask that person, saying exactly that, 'Are You Ok you just don't seem to be yourself lately'. Even when that person replies 'yes thanks I'm fine'; that person knows someone cares about them.

Something familiar to most, is where a family member has been telling a loved one, they are very worried. Suggesting they speak to someone or to seek help, the loved one seem to dig their heals in saying I'll be fine. Then along comes someone else not related nor a close friend but known to that very person. They suggest to the same person that they should speak to someone because they have noticed a difference. We roll our eyes as we hear our loved one say 'Oh OK' and do it. Although a rolling of the eyes moment it is also a time of relief. This situation shows we should not assume that a person's family or other would have already said something. They probably have. But where you personally feel someone is not themselves, ask Are You OK.

Where people who are experiencing feelings that are stronger than usual, don't feel like themselves, may also feel they are on their own and that no one knows or understands what they are going through. Yes as individuals we all have our individual ways we respond, and no one ever really knows exactly how we feel. But this doesn't mean others have not, or are currently not, experiencing similar feelings. By acknowledging we are not feeling ourselves to others usually opens up others in similar situations to also open up and respond. This then becomes a shared experience and our ability to cope is heightened.

Recently I was told of a situation where someone was struggling with stress. Their partner was doing their best to help but also felt frustration and stress from deep concern, as nothing they were doing appeared to be getting through. A business associate came to the farm, this person asked, 'how are you going?' and when the reply he received was 'I'm not doing to well, feeling very down lately' .There are two great things the business associate did after he said 'Yes I've noticed that you are not yourself lately, I've been a bit worried about you'. After listening to the person giving that person time to talk and release their supressed feelings,

the business associate then went on to tell the person their own very personal experiences when they were in a similar situation. Very personal, honest, from the heart. They opened up and chose to be vulnerable. The result was extremely powerful and helpful. The businessperson not only helped the person feeling down but also that person's partner was helped. The realisation of, 'we are not on our own', resulted in a lessening of the anxiety for both people. So much so that they were able to begin to move forward again.

Remember you are not alone. Be true to yourself, understand it takes strength to say' I'm not doing too well'. Similarly, it takes strength as someone who has noticed something about a person you know to ask, 'Are You OK'. Our mind might be giving us reasons why we shouldn't say something, but our hearts will tell us what we need to do.

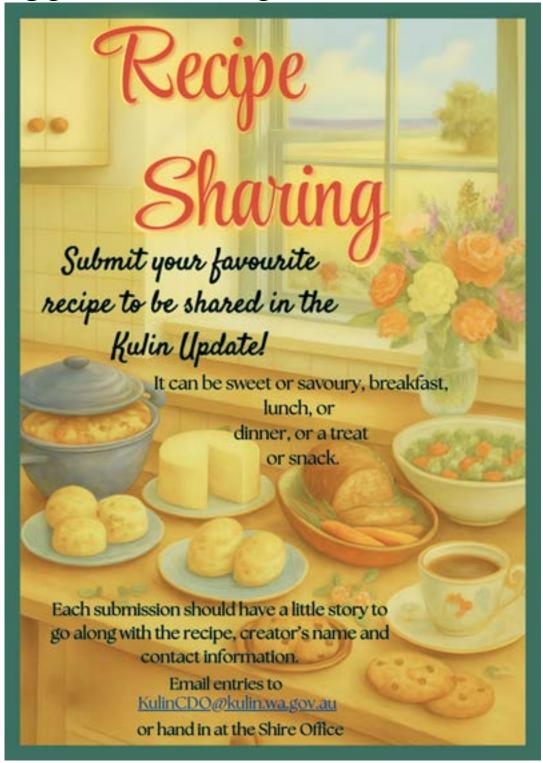
Winter garden care tips:

Cold Winds, Warm Bowls: Pam's Peanut Butter Curry is worth sharing! When I called on the community to share their favourite recipes last week, I wasn't sure what

When I called on the community to share their favourite recipes last week, I wasn't sure what to expect. Would anyone respond? Would I be sitting here, knowing I'm surrounded by amazing cooks and wishing we could swap tasty ideas for our families—but not hearing a peep?

Well, I needn't have worried! Pam McInnes answered the call with her delicious Peanut Butter Curry recipe, and I couldn't wait to get home and give it a go.

There's something deeply comforting about a flavour-packed curry simmering away on the stove. The scent of ginger and garlic wafts through the house, wrapping around every corner and getting tummies grumbling in anticipation, especially when the wind is howling outside. Not only does it serve up a generous six portions (perfect for feeding a hungry crew), but the leftovers are just as delightful the next day—making lunch something to look forward to.

It's great paired with steamed rice, but if you're keen to elevate things a little, coconut rice is a sensational match. You'll find that recipe on the next page! When I made this, more than one curious nose peeked around the kitchen door to ask what was cooking.

Pam's dish brings together tender chicken, fragrant spices, creamy coconut milk, and the richness of peanut butter to create a curry you'll want to make again and again—and it's a perfect reminder of how deliciously generous our community can be.

Peanut Butter Curry Serves 6

Ingredients:

- · 2 tbsp vegetable oil
- 2 large onions, finely sliced
- · 4 garlic cloves, chopped
- 1 tbsp fresh ginger, grated
- 1 tbsp ground turmeric
- 1 tbsp ground cumin
- 1 tbsp ground coriander
- 1 tbsp chilli powder (optional)
- 1 kg boneless, skinless chicken thighs, cut into 2-inch pieces
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup smooth peanut butter
- 1 × 400g tin diced tomatoes
- 1×400 ml tin coconut milk
- ½ tsp sugar

- Salt, to season
- Fresh coriander leaves, to serve
- 2 tbsp chopped peanuts, to serve
- Lime cheeks or wedges, to serve

Method:

- 1. Heat oil in a heavy based pot over medium heat, add onions, garlic and ginger. Fry stirring regularly for about 5 minutes, until very fragrant and starting to brown.
- Add ground spices and chilli (if using) stirring well to combine.
 Add chicken and stir to coat.

- Add peanut butter, tomatoes, coconut milk and sugar and stir well.
- 3. Bring the mixture to the boil, then reduce heat and simmer uncovered for 15-20 minutes until chicken is very tender stirring occasionally. If the sauce thickens a little too much you can add a little water.
- 4. Taste and adjust the seasoning as required. Scatter with coriander and a sprinkle of ground peanuts if you like and serve with lime wedges.

Leveling up - Coconut Rice is easy!

Fluffy Coconut Rice

Serves 6

Ingredients:

- 2 & 1/2 cups Jasmine Rice
- 700ml Coconut Milk
- 1 & 3/4 cups Water
- 3 tbsp sugar
- 1 tsp salt
- 4 kaffir lime leaves (crushed in your hand)

Method:

1. Rinse the rice in water until the water runs

clear.

- 2. Drain the rice and then soak it in water for at least 1 hour before draining it in a colander for 5 minutes or so. You want to get as much water out as you can.
- 3. Pre-heat your oven to 180 fan forced.
- 4. Place your rice in a baking pan/cake tin about 20cm diameter with the kaffir lime leaves.
- 5. Heat your coconut milk, water, sugar and salt in a saucepan over high heat. Bring it to a boil to disolve the sugar.
- 6. Pour the coconut mix over the rice and stir

- it quickly to spread through evenly. Cover with tin foil and bake for 40 minutes.
- 7. Remove the pan from the over and check the liquid is all absorbed, there will be some cream on the surface which is normal but there shouldn't be liquid running around underneath.
- 8. Rest the rice with the foil cover on for 15 minutes minimum!
- 9. Fluff it up with a fork or spatula and serve!

Easy peasy and yummo!

Shearers Incoming! Jammy goodness saves the day

Years ago, I got a last-minute call from Mum: could I help feed the full shearing team on our farm? Shearers, rouseys, classers, presser—plus all of us working in the shed. She'd thought it was all happening the next day, but thanks to a shift in the weather, the crew was coming early. Now Mum was flat out wrangling smoko and lunch, helping Dad pen up, and getting the next mob down.

I jumped into action—fridge open, pantry raided, and kitchen mission underway. Mini quiche fillings and frozen puff pastry? In. Savoury pinwheels packed for school lunches? Sorry kids, drafted for duty. A pot of stew was already bubbling away, leftovers destined for pies... or they were until that fresh loaf in the bread maker took centre stage. Lunch was sorted.

But I still needed something sweet—something quick and satisfying, beyond the trusty bikkie tin.

Pie pastry ingredients? Check. Homemade jam from earlier in the week? Even better. And so, Jammy Roll Overs were born. Quick to make, delicious warm from the oven, and an instant hit with the crew. They've been a firm family favourite ever since—proof that necessity truly is the mother of invention.

Jammy Rollovers

Makes about 20

Ingredients:

- 250ml sour cream
- 500g plain flour
- 400g unsalted butter, chilled
- Jam (Strawberry, Apricot, Blackberry, Raspberry or Cherry all work!)
- Fresh berries or dried apricots halved if you want to go a little extra
- Icing Sugar

Method:

Option 1 - The old fashioned way

- 1. Rub the butter into the flour in a large bowl until it looks like breadcrumbs or sand. Use your finger tips or a pastry cutter and try and work quickly so that you don't melt the butter too much.
- 2. Add the sour cream and bring it together incorporating it with a pastry whisk or spoon

- until combined and coming into a ball.
- 3. Wrap in glad wrap and rest for 20 minutes in the fridge.

Option 2 - The easy way

- 1. Add the flour and cubed butter into a food processor and pulse until the mix looks like breadcrumbs or sand.
- 2. Add the sour cream and continue to pulse until the pastry comes together into a ball.
- 3. Wrap in glad wrap and rest for 20 minutes in the fridge.

Step 2

- Pre-heat your oven to
 220 degrees fan forced.
- Roll out your dough to about ½ a centimetre thickness and cut into circles about as big as a saucer for a tea-cup. Approx 13cm in diameter.
- 3. Beat an egg in a small dish to use as an egg wash.
- 4. If you are using fresh berries/ as well as jam then gently warm your jam and incorporate your fresh fruit into the jam. Place a generous teaspoon

- of your jam/jam mix into the centre of each circle.
- 5. Egg wash around the edges and then fold together in a half moon shape. Pinch the edges together to crimp and seal.
- Make two small slits in the top of each Roll Over for the steam to escape.
- 7. Place the roll overs on a flat oven tray and bake for 25 minutes at 220 degrees, or until they are golden.
- 8. Remove from the oven and carefully move to a cooling rack. Allow to cool until only just warm to the touch.
- 9. Dust with icing sugar and serve.

NOTES:

You might find that some of the jam escapes through the steam slits, don't worry about this, it is just extra tastiness.

They last well in an airtight container for a few days, not that I ever have leftovers unless I hide them.
