The honour has only been awarded four times by Kulin Shire Council. John Wilson, Graeme Robertson, Jim Sullivan and Greg Hadlow.

Barry West has provided significant leadership and guidance to the Kulin community with 34 years of continuous service to the Kulin Shire Council. Highly respected by his peers, Barry has made a high caliber contribution to the Shire of Kulin.

Barry has worked tirelessly for Kulin which extends beyond the Kulin Shire. Freemanship, although referred to as "Freeman of Kulin Shire" can be more encompassing than council duties performed under Local Government. Community involvement usually commences prior to being elected to council. A commitment to sporting bodies, emergency services or whatever, to make your town/region a better place to live. Barry's commitment to footy and cricket clubs in the early years, was the initial grounding to eventually becoming a Shire Councillor.

Encompassing all facets of community improvement in the social structure that makes Kulin thrive and progress, comes from a commitment to improve, in which Barry's dedication to Kulin is evident. Agriculture, advocacy for rail retention, Cooperative Bulk Handling (Barry is a current board member of CBH), Cultivating Kulin Committee, Kulin Development Cooperative, sporting clubs, roads that benefit all, local events and a general dedication for 'everything' Kulin.

Freebairn Recreation Centre - an amazing project

The Freebairn Recreation Centre (FRC) opened in 2003. After the opening of the FRC, Barry continued as the Shire Representative on Freebairn Recreation Advisory Committee (FRAC) for a further 16 years. A mind-blowing accomplishment and I'm sure Barry will agree that, in conjunction with FRAC development committee, one of his most significant achievements as a councillor was the establishment of the Freebairn Recreation Centre.

And now to reflect on Barry's service.

Following the retirement of Clarrie King from the Kulin Rock Ward ("Ward" - now that's a word from the past that unless you are a city dweller doesn't exist in the BUSH anymore!) Barry was elected as councillor in May 1989. Barry continued his service to the Shire of Kulin for 34 continuous years which equates to approximately 374 council meetings (give or take a few), amounting to about a year of his life.

Barry was elected Deputy President for twelve years from 2003 - 2015 and President for six years from 2015-2021. He represented Kulin Shire on the local RoeROC executive for 18 years during his tenure as Deputy President and President, also serving two years as Chairperson of RoeROC.

A long standing involvement with the Western Australian Local Government Association (WALGA) Barry was awarded a Meritorious Service Award from the Country Shires Association in 2022. Barry was Shire of Kulin Central Country Zone Representative from 2011-2020, Zone delegate and member and Deputy Chair of the Zone Executive Committee from 2019-2021. Barry was deservingly awarded the Eminent Service Award from West Australian Local Government Association (WALGA). He is the only Kulin Councillor to have received this prestigious Award.

Apart from the establishment of the Freebairn Recreation Centre, other significant Shire projects during Barry's time on council include the Emergency Services building, first Bendigo Bank in Western Australia, relocation of the fantastic Kulin water slide, new Aquatic Centre, new fuel facility, establishment of the refurbished CRC to the current Shire Offices and Medical Centre, deep sewerage, housing projects, relocation of the caravan park, town beautification, playgrounds and the recent development of our popular "All Ages Precinct".

Barry West, you have worked tirelessly for this community and region. A fitting reward for your enormous efforts and a well-earned accolade, and I consider it my privilege to present you, on behalf of the Shire of Kulin and the Kulin public, with Honorary Freeman of Kulin Shire.







Peter Webster Entwistle Eulogy

Thank you everyone for coming here today to celebrate the life of Peter Entwistle, Pete the Pom, Uncle Peter and most importantly to me - my Dad.

Born in Sale, Chesire to John and Dorothy Entwistle in 1946, Peter grew up on a small farm in Newborough alongside his siblings Jogn, Pat and Sheila. He enjoyed junior school, endured high school, and found freedom and confidence in the Boy Scouts. Peter studied at Blackpool Tech, where at seventeen he met his first wife.

He also excelled, not just at courting our Mum, but at his studies where he achieved the second highest butchery qualification in the UK.

Mum and Dad or Cath and Pete married young and quite quickly welcome son David in 1966, less than nine months after they married, then I came along in 1968.

In 1969 they chose to immigrate to Australia-favouring it over Canada and Rhodesia- and Dad fell in love with the country the moment he stepped onto the Fremantle wharf.

Daughter Janet was born at Bentley Hospital in 1971.

After the breakdown of his marriage to Cath and working in Tom Price as a catering supervisor, Peter decided to leave Australia and return to England. It was not a choice he made lightly, and he believed at the time that it was in everyone 's best interests. It was a decision he reflected on-and questioned-for the rest of his life.

In England he married Brenda and ran pubs in Wiltshire and Trowbridge. Dad continued his expensive addiction to wedding cake and later married Polly.

Peter said that the first time he married was for love, the second time for money, and the third time for sex.

Dad permanently returned to Australia in 1989 to run the Kulin Hotel.

At the end of his life, at Murdoch hospice, when Janet was talking to him about the happiest moments in his life, he said his first marriage was the best.

I think despite getting divorced, he loved Mum his whole life. He always talked about her in glowing terms.

When my wife, Carolyn and I got married in 1993, we woke up in the morning after our wedding in our hotel, we saw Mum and Dad standing on the balcony of another room. They both looked very relaxed and obviously had a bit of a reunion for old times' sake.

Because Mum and Dad split up and Dad went back to England when we were quite young, he spent a lot of time with our cousins, who were similar ages to us, while they were growing up.

They adored their Uncle Peter. And he loved them all-Heather, Hazel, Les, Helen Beverly, Andrew, Helen Janet, Rebecca, Jeanette and Ruth. Peter and Heather had an especially close relationship, and I know she's watching this service right now, from her house in Devon, England.

Heather told us this was a very special period for him. He lived with his brother, his wife Jackie, and their kids in Devon and the house was always full of fun and laughter.

Peter particularly enjoyed the local Devon traditions, the highlight always being the Hatherleigh Carnival, where flaming tar barrels were dragged through the streets at 5am while copious amounts of cider were consumed at the same time!

Peter travelled widely-through Singapore, Thailand, Ireland, France, Spain, Amsterdam and especially Tunisia, his favourite place.

In Kulin he contributed proudly to the community, serving on the Kulin Charity Rally Committee and supporting local initiatives. He loved the town and all it achieved.

It was only a few weeks ago that Robbie told me that they used to sit at the end of the bar and solve the problems of the world and they created a few more as well.

Unfortunately, David, Janet and I didn't have as much Fathering-time as we would have liked to. When he and Mum split up and he went back to England, we were aged 9, 7 and 4.

He came back to Australia when I was 21. He spent a short amount of time in Perth before moving here, to Kulin.

He'd come to Perth for some birthdays, new babies, Christmas, all the family weddings and other special occasions.

When Carolyn and I had our second baby he lived with us and cooked a meal for us every night, which we were very grateful for.

Quite recently, he went back to England on a holiday, and I know that he loved travelling around and catching up with everyone in Devon. But at the end of the day, Kulin was Dad's home.

When his health was failing at the end, he told us that he'd rather die in Kulin than live in Perth.

His friends are here. His dog Dylan, who passed away only a week ago was a special part of his life.

He also had so many memories of owning the pub, having lots-and lots-of drinks, and cooking for guests.

The one year we made it to the Kulin Bush Races he was in hospital in Perth and he really wished he could be here-cooking fish and chips for all the race goers, as he loved to do every year.

Of course, he and Robbie were the backbone of the Bush rallies for many years, and Dad was proud of how much they raised for charity.

He really enjoyed the Old Bastards Association and the Freemasons, and he loved his neighbours.

Our family would like to thank everyone from the Kulin Community for giving Dad such a happy life, helping out with his fish tank and his dog and everything else when he had to go to hospital.

Peter believed in one guiding principal: "Be fair." He carried that spirit through a full and varied life, always grateful for the journeys he chose and the people he met along the way.

He wanted his ashes to be brought to Kulin, so he could be laid to rest here.

It has given us some peace, knowing that we've fulfilled his final wishes. Tony Monaghan

Wheatbelt farmer becomes face of Christmas Appeal to support country cancer patients

Wheatbelt farmer, Gerard Hodges, is the face of Cancer Council WA's 2025 Christmas Appeal after a shock skin cancer diagnosis turned his life upside down.

The fit and healthy farmer first noticed what looked like a simple graze on his hand during the 2022 harvest season

"Bumps and grazes aren't unusual for farmers, so I shrugged it off," Gerard said. "But it just didn't heal. One bandage turned into three."



When the Royal Flying Doctor Service came through town, Gerard had it checked. What was first thought to be a minor basal cell carcinoma turned out to be Stage 4 squamous cell carcinoma, an aggressive form of skin cancer that had already spread to his kidney and liver. Within days, Gerard was in Perth, unsure where he would stay or how long he would be away from the farm. After weeks in ICU fighting pneumonia, organ failure, and even surviving two cardiac arrests, he was told about Cancer Council WA's accommodation Lodges.

Since moving into Milroy Lodge in Shenton Park, Gerard has found more than just a place to stay, he has found peace in the gardens, comfort in the 24-hour support, and connection with others who understand what he is going through.

"I'm so proud to be the face of this year's Christmas Appeal," Gerard said.

"I encourage the WA community to get behind it and support this vital accommodation service for regional people like me."

This year alone the lodges have had almost 5,000 check-ins from country patients and carers. By donating to our Christmas Appeal, you're ensuring country cancer patients like Gerard have vital support when they need it most.





A CHRISTMAS TURKEY WORTH THE EFFORT

Christmas is literally right around the corner, and that turkey in the chook pen is looking mighty suspicious... acting super shady.

Maybe he knows his days are numbered!

All jokes aside, turkey can be a bit of a pain to cook. But with a little effort, you can whip up something truly mouthwatering. This recipe has

a few stages—it's one I only pull out for a special occasion (and really,

Over the past few months I've shared a whole bunch of my own personal recipes here in the Update. I don't proclaim to be the world's greatest cook, but I do feel confident saying that I cook with love and care. Each time I step into my kitchen, my goal is simple: to create something tasty that feeds both the soul and the belly of my family.

It's often said that your body is a temple and you need to treat it as such. Feed it well. For me, that doesn't mean food has to be "healthy" all

Ingredients:



For the Brine

- 6 litres water
- 1 large orange (or 2 smaller, quartered)

the time, but it does mean being conscious of what you're making and eating. Nourishing yourself, your friends, and your family is a gift. It's a way to show care, respect, and to give them a little piece of yourself.

So whether you've tried these recipes or simply enjoyed the stories alongside them, I hope you've had a laugh, found some inspiration, and perhaps reminisced with me as I've shared memories collected along the way.

Writing this section has been a joy — a chance to let you know me a little better and to celebrate the everyday magic of food.

- 250 g fine sea salt
- 200 g sugar
- 3 tbsp black peppercorns
- 1 bouquet garni
- 1 cinnamon stick
- 1 tbsp caraway seeds
- 4 cloves
- 2 tbsp allspice berries
- 4 star anise

Because, like every time I sit down at the table with friends and family, it's never just about the meal. It's about connection, community, and caring. And this section of the Update has been another way to share that spirit with you all.

I hope it's been a tasty journey, and I can't wait to cook up a storm with you again next year — sharing once more a place at the table.

So, for the last time in 2025, from my table to yours.

- 2 tbsp white mustard seeds
- 2 onions (unpeeled, quartered)
- 6 cm piece fresh ginger (unpeeled, sliced)
- 4 tbsp maple syrup
- 4 tbsp runny honey
- stalks from 1 bunch fresh parsley
- 1 x 5.5 kg turkey

For the Baste

- 6-7 fresh sage leaves, chopped
- 5-6 fresh thyme stems
- 2-3 sprigs rosemary
- 2-3 sprigs oregano
- 1½ cups mayonnaise (yes, mayo!)
- 2 tsp paprika
- 2 tsp onion powder
- · 2 tsp garlic powder
- · 2 tbsp runny honey
- 2 tsp chicken stock powder

For the Stuffing

- 2 onions
- 3 stalks celery
- · 2 tsp minced garlic
- 1 bunch fresh sage (30 g)
- ½ cup chopped dried apples
- 100 g dried cranberries
- 180 g pecans, finely chopped
- · 2 oranges, juiced and zested
- · 330 ml dry cider
- 1 tsp nutmeg
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 4 cups breadcrumbs
- 500 g pork mince
- · salt and pepper
- · olive oil
- 2 tbsp unsalted butter

Method

Step One: Brine Your Bird

1. Grab your biggest pot (or a clean bucket). Add the water, squeeze in the orange juice, toss in the husks, and stir in the

- salt, sugar, maple syrup, and honey until dissolved. Add the rest of the brine ingredients, then submerge your turkey. Top up with water if needed. Cover and chill for at least 24 hours—48 is even better.
- 2. When it's time to cook, take the turkey out of the brine, pat it dry, and let it rest at room temperature for 1–2 hours.

Step Two: Make the Baste

1. Here's where the magic happens. Mix the herbs, spices, honey, and chicken stock powder into the mayonnaise. Yes, mayo—it locks in moisture and flavour. Pop this in the fridge while you tackle the stuffing.

Step Three: Stuffing Magic

- 1. Finely dice the onions and celery and set aside. Warm the orange juice with cranberries until steaming, then set aside. In a pan, heat olive oil and butter, tear in sage leaves, and gently brown. Add onions, celery, and garlic, cooking low and slow until golden and sweet.
- 2. Stir in orange zest, cranberry mix, dried apples, pecans, cinnamon, nutmeg, salt, and pepper. Add cider and let it bubble until shiny. In another pan, brown the pork mince.

 Combine everything with breadcrumbs in a big bowl and mix well with your hands.

Step Four: Roasting

- 1. Rub some of the mayo baste inside the turkey, then loosely fill with stuffing. Don't pack too tightly—it needs room to cook evenly. Coat the outside generously with the mayo mix, season with salt and pepper, and truss if needed.
- 2. Preheat oven to 220°C.
 Place turkey upside down on a roasting rack with onions, carrots, and celery underneath.
 Roast for 30 minutes, then flip right side up, baste again, and reduce oven to 165°C. Roast for 45 minutes, baste again, and continue roasting for another 30 minutes or until the internal temperature reaches 75°C (probe between breast and leg). Cover loosely with foil if browning too quickly.

And here's the best part—this is the moment to pour yourself a drink and relax while your hard work pays off with amazing aromas floating through the house.

Step Five: Rest and Serve

1. Remove from the oven and let it rest for at least 30 minutes. Carve, serve with gravy and cranberry sauce, and bask in the glory of your Christmas feast.

Hands in the Garden: A Year of Growth

Then I was a little kid, counting down to Christmas, there always seemed to be a flurry of activity leading up to the big day. Friends and family would make the rounds for BBQs, parties and catch ups, and the pressure was on to have the garden looking spiffy. I remember those summer evenings, being sent off to bed while Mum and Dad kept working away in the yard once the Albany Doctor rolled through, making it just that little bit more pleasant. The smell of freshly mown lawn and sprinklers ticking away after a hot day still takes me straight back to childhood, when summer felt endless and carefree.

There's a fair bit of wisdom in working once the heat of the day breaks. But let's be honestat this time of year, whether you're working, farming, simply trying to keep up with the social whirl of the season, evenings might be the only time you've got to tend the garden. Luckily, that's not a bad thing. Even now, I find my moments of calm out there among the plants. Still, as we stare down the barrel of another hot couple of weeks and look ahead to a long summer, it's worth remembering that our gardens

will need a little extra TLC.

With that in mind, I rang Mum this morning for her tried and true tips. She didn't hesitate:

> "MUI CH! Mulch. your garden and keep the mulch up. Don't choke your plantsgive them a bit of room around the base or trunk—but keep that mulch topped up and then water sensibly. There's no point watering once it's hot; it evaporates faster than the plants can drink it. Wait until after sundown or get in early before the sun bites. In Kulin, that stingsets in by 7:00am, so if you're watering in the morning, do it early. And know your plants-not everything likes to be watered the same way. Some love a sprinkle all over, others just want their feet wet, and some need a proper soaking. A sprinkler isn't the answer for every situation."

All good advice. And with those words ringing in my ears, I turned to the next item on my agenda: the lawn. Because really, at the end of a hot day, if you're not off for a swim, there are few things better than sitting under a shady tree on a soft green lawn with a cold drink in hand. So, I reached out to some of Kulin's lawn connoisseurs for their thoughts on keeping the grass lush and inviting through summer...

"Keep up the water, make sure you're watering either very early or after sunset. Make sure you are fertilising at least every 6 weeks and using soil wetter. And lastly mow regularly!"

As I wrap up this year's garden musings, I can't help but feel grateful for the wisdom, encouragement and laughter that's been shared along the way. Gardening has a funny way of reminding us that patience and persistence pay off, even when the weeds seem endless or the dogs have other ideas. It's not just about the plants—it's about the people, the stories, and the sense of belonging that grows alongside the tomatoes and roses.

GET YOUR HANDS IN THE GARDEN

I'll be working hard on my own garden journey over the summer while we're on break here at the Update. It's been such a pleasure getting my hands in the garden this yeareach day learning a little more, mostly through trial and error (and sometimes more error than success!). But that's the life of an aspiring green thumb. Along the way I've gathered fabulous advice from local gardeners, friends and family. And when I think back to the young girl who had to be firmly told she'd be helping in the garden—when she'd much rather have been off down the paddock on her horse or bike-I can't help but smile and think, "My, haven't I come a long way."

I still look out at my garden, only a year old and very much in its infancy, and feel frustrated waiting for things to grow—or for puppies to stop digging and chewing! But when I look back at the difference we've made in just 12 months, I feel proud of how far it's come. Another year on, it might just be starting to look pretty special. That's the hope, anyway.








MENTAL HEALTH & WELLBEING TIPS THIS FESTIVE SEASON

No more than 10 standard drinks a **week**



No more than 4 standard drinks in **one day**

These are guidelines, not targets - drinking less is always safer.

- Alternate drinks water between alcoholic drinks
- Eat before and during slows alcohol absorption
- Pace yourself take breaks, sip slowly
- Choose lower-strength or alcohol-free options
- Avoid "topping up" keep track of what you've had
- Plan your transport organise a sober driver or lift


